The Loaves and Fishes pantry continues to reap the benefit of Pastor Dennis and Barbara's Lenten Challenge. It has been so nice to offer a wider variety of items and keep our shelves stocked. Some of you are very good at spotting some great sales, so we hope that we will continue to see shoppers taking advantage of digital deals, BOGO promotions, and markdown items throughout the year.

Our Sunday School may be small in numbers, but the children have big hearts. They are making Easter cards to pass out along with the sweet treats that have been collected. A shout out to all who donated or made cards. We were also able to give out over a dozen Easter Egg Decorating Kits to our families, and The Lower Cape Outreach Council received a donation of grocery gift cards. Our clients will be receiving a pleasant surprise just in time for Easter.

January and February are our quietest months, but March has already seen a substantial increase as seasonal workers return. We estimate that we will be filling about 60-75 more bags of groceries this month and can't even predict what April and May will be like. ORGAN UPDATE (1) Pipes for Praise Update:

Good news! We have raised an additional \$6,720 in donations to the Organ Fund as of March 18. Thank you to those givers for their generosity! With matching funds of up to \$15,000 pledged by an anonymous donor for donations received in March and April, that means a total of \$13,420 has been made so far this month towards the new organ. The grand total raised to date for the new organ is over \$339,000. We still need to raise about \$54,000 towards our goal, and there is still over \$8,000 available in matching funds for donations made in March and April. 

Oxygen's Vital Role

Although inhaling oxygen is taken for granted by many people, it's a very vital function. Humanity can not survive without it, and inhaling is not even a conscious requirement unless one needs to take a deep breath of air. When we inhale, our lungs oxygenate our blood. Blood without oxygen flows from the heart's right ventricle through pulmonary arteries to capillaries enriched with membrane in your lungs. Here, blue blood gets oxygenated into red blood that's then sent to the heart's left ventricle to be pumped through upper and lower aortas. This oxygen-rich blood circulates through the entire body in one minute! It amazes me that anyone can take this phenomenon for granted. It is a gift from God!


Body cells use oxygen to transfer energy stored in food to a usable form. This process, called cellular respiration, allows our cells to harness energy to perform vital functions such as powering both voluntary and involuntary muscles such as the heart. Oxygen also helps move materials in and out of our cells trapping dust and foreign matter. Oxygen helps regulate body temperature, and it can react with natural

elements such as sodium and potassium to generate healthy compounds.

Without oxygen in your body, cells can function for only a limited time. Long-term depletion leads to cell death. The air in our atmosphere is 4/5 nitrogen and 1/5 oxygen, so does that mean we inhale both nitrogen and oxygen? Oxygen is heavier than nitrogen so it descends to the low levels of our atmosphere for our breathing pleasure. If nitrogen was the heavier of the two elements, God knows what a predicament that would be!


