View From the Deck



<u>"You OK?"</u> "Yes, sort of..."

I reached out to a friend, inquiring how he and family were. He responded, "We're doing well all things considered. Still working. Nobody sick. About the most we could ask for right now."

I responded and asked a follow-up question. That's when he opened up some more, "Definitely a stressful time for all kinds of reasons. We definitely feel lucky that it's not worse for us, but it's hard never knowing if the worst is coming."

"I haven't seen Mom, my kids haven't seen Gramma since May" someone else lamented, "It's hard to know what the right thing to do is."

Regarding race relations in America, specifically regarding structural racism and white privilege, someone shared, "I'm spinning. I'm caught between generations, between certain views and experiences my parent has, and very different view and experiences of a grown child. And I'm not sure whether any of us feel fully heard or understood."

Whether it's COVID19, concerns about health or school openings, the economy, racism or the President's latest tweet... whether it's frustration, anxiety, confusion, anger, or guilt we are feeling, many of us will say, "I'm OK." We know we have much to be thankful for. Many of us have choices. We can choose to isolate ourselves or not, stay at home or not, without worrying about where the next meal will come from. And still, if the conversation continues, we may hear a qualified response: "How are you?" "OK , sort of."

Two things have helped me recently in dealing with this "sort of OK" feeling. I was checking out with my groceries at Trader Joe's. The cashier was a man from Jamaica. He is a Christian who spoke enthusiastically about his Pentecostal background and his faith. He was surprised by how few churches there seemed to be around Hyannis. "We take our faith seriously," he shared, "pray every time before leaving the house. My boys have strong biblical names, Isaac and Ezekiel." "My girls too," I smiled. "Joanna and Lydia." He asked about my employment status, and how things were going. He seemed impressed that I was a pastor and not too shocked about the beer or large quantities of chocolate in my cart. "Say a prayer for me," he said after checking the last of my groceries - and I have. Sometimes we can't solve the world's problems, (doesn't mean we shouldn't try!) but we can focus on one relationship at a time.

The other thing that is helping me is the Psalms, the prayer book of the Bible. In last week's study one of the Psalms we looked at was 63. The Psalmist likens his situation to being "in a dry and weary land where there is no water." He lies awake at night. Yet, he is determined to affirm God's steadfast love and offer his praise. His strategy for moving forwards, beyond "sorta OK" is a commitment to join others for worship (v.2), to stay connected to his faith community, and to intentionally recall God's help in times past. Praying the Psalms invites us to reflect on what in our lives or world feels dry and weary, and to give it to God in prayer. Praying the Psalms gives us an opportunity to again center our lives in God, and in God's steadfast love - something good whether you're feeling OK or only sort of OK.

God is our refuge and strength.

During these challenging times, we cannot make music as we once were able; it is such a lifeblood for us musicians – and for many I suspect. In my mind this month I've heard a persistent voice *God is our refuge and strength, Psalm 46*. My mind plays the various versions I know, not the least of which are based on Martin Luther's paraphrase *Ein Feste Burg, A Mighty Fortress.* I'd like to share some music based on this Psalm with you.



As sad as it makes me not to be making music regularly with our musicians, I have been devouring so much music on my own – it's been feeding me richly. Recently I found a fabulous recording of Felix *Mendelssohn's Symphony #5, 'Reformation'* by the Frankfurt Radio Orchestra with a dynamic young conductor who reaches in and brings this piece to life - Jeremie Rhorer! The theme and variations are in the final movement which begins around 22.55. https://youtu.be/otcrnrQAwD8

Max Reger is well known for his over 100 chorale preludes, but he is perhaps most famous for the handful of concert pieces based on chorales. In these major works of usually 10-15 minutes, the theme, or protagonist, undergoes a literal spiritual transformation and the listener is the beneficiary of all that effort. Here is a wonderful rendition by my friend Jens Korndorfer played on the Sauer organ in Berlin Cathedral. I got to know Jens when he and my friend Christian Lane were competitors in the Canadian International Organ Competition in 2011. That was my introduction to all my wonderful Canadian and international colleagues and the work we did together culminating in the Canadian International Organ Festival in 2017. Jens is at First Presbyterian Church in Atlanta and teaches at Georgia State. This is an absolutely drop-dead performance on a stunning instrument – a must see and hear.

Ein Feste Burg, Cantata 80 of *JS Bach* is performed by John Eliot Gardiner and the Monteverdi Choir with period instruments. The debate continues to rage over period instruments and Bach, especially since he was always interested in new instruments and rewriting things for different combinations of voices and instruments, not to mention his arrangements of other composers such as Vivaldi. However, there is no debate over the quality of Gardiner's fine Bach performances – I hope you will check this one out. https://youtu.be/7i2z7prCyDY



Update from Reopening Task Force

The Reopening Task Force is pleased to offer protocols and guidelines for weddings and funerals.

A synopsis follows. For a complete list of the protocols and guidelines please contact the church office.

Weddings:

- * May be held inside the building but with a maximum of 12 people at this time (this includes the Pastor, Minister of Music, etc.)
- * Masks required (may be removed by the couple for a kiss)
- * Physical distancing must be followed except for those residing in the same household

Funerals:

- * For Funerals inside the church, the same guidelines apply as outlined for weddings
- * For Funerals/Memorial Services outdoors but not in the memorial garden, masks required and physical distancing but no limits on attendance
- * For Funeral Services in the Memorial Garden, masks and physical distancing required, maximum of 10 people (based on measurements and spacing)

These recommendations were approved by the Church Council.

Memorial Services and a Wedding are currently being planned.

Through the Lens of Science...

<u>Proposals for SIBLINGS of our SUN</u> By Doug Kenney

Astronomers believe it's possible to identify the stars that formed from the same nebular our sun did billions of years ago.

Somewhere in the Milky Way Galaxy we have a family of stellar siblings. There are hundreds if not thousands of stars that formed in the same dust cloud as our sun, and astronomers understand what occurs in a stellar nursery containing hydrogen and helium that collapses upon itself (because of gravity) making hydrogen fuse into helium. A great example of this process would be the Orion Nebular, a hotbed of stellar formation. Stars don't begin their lives in isolation; they begin with siblings. Here are a few sibling proposals:

Six of the 8 stars in the handle of the Big Dipper are moving together in the same direction as the sun, about 80 light years away, suggesting they're candidates of our sun's siblings. Detailed spectra now exists for thousands of stars so astronomers can compare existing elements to the ones in our sun.

In 2014, astronomers announced a possible sibling of the sun known as HD162826 found in the constellation of Hercules about 100 light years away. Another possible sibling was discovered in 2018 known as HD186302 about 184 light years away in the constellation of Pavo the Peacock. Solar Sibling-1 located in the constellation of Cygnus is about one thousand light years away. The Gaia Spacecraft is now listing hundreds of siblings for evaluation. Gaia, launched by the ESA long ago, is revolutionizing astronomy with a 3D map of the entire Milky Way Galaxy.

We know most stars have companion stars such as Alpha A and B Centaurus, the closest stars to the sun. In fact, there's even a third star called Proxima. Binary star systems occur throughout the universe. What is not common is our own Sun. That's why we continue to keep searching for our companion star(s).

In our recent Bible Study "Praying the Psalms" we looked at Psalms 8 and 24 which both speak of God's majestic creation. The explorations and curiosity of scientists like Doug seems to be a natural continuation of the wonder expressed in Psalm 8 and divine sovereignty affirmed in Psalm 24:1-2. For me, whenever I take our dog for her late evening walk, I look up at the Big Dipper. Next time I look up I'll ponder what it means to be a sibling of the sun, even as I recited Psalm 8:3-4:

When I look at your heavens, the work of your fingers, the moon and the stars that you have established; what are human beings that you are mindful of them, mortals that your care for them? Yet you have made them.



THE FUND FOR FUTURE CHURCH LEADERS:

Ah August, hazy, hot & humid days, back to school sales,...! You may also have noticed that recently, our church offering envelopes included a "Special Offering" that highlights a less traditional but enormously significant educational effort. The focus of this offering, the *Fund for Future Church Leaders*, is to encourage and support our St. Peters' members and the needs of the greater church as a whole as seminary students commit to becoming leaders in our church.

This commitment is challenging in many ways and the financial burden is often overwhelming to many who have chosen this path. Current levels of seminarian debt remain staggering. In 2010, it was reported that 70% of seminary graduates carried a median debt of \$43,325. In addition, our churches incur significant expense as we provide stipends, pay seminary fees and possibly help with housing for valuable interns who train in our congregations.

Our last intern, Lydia Tembo, reflected at the end of her internship: *I love being a leader in ministries that serve God and God's creation. Being at St. Peter's has affirmed my call to ministry, parish ministry and pastoral care/counseling. My goal to "lead with compassionate pastoral authority" has been supported by the various leadership opportunities that I was involved in during my internship. Being able to walk with people in their spiritual journeys, listen to their stories and work in God's mission has been humbling and I don't take them for granted.*

During the month of August, prayerfully consider the *Fund for Future Church Leaders* Special Offering envelope. Please understand that a contribution to this fund is a means to 1) support, by helping with seminary costs or debt, our members who made the commitment to become devoted church leaders and, 2) provide funds for our congregation to assist interns in coming to us. The quest of these seminarians for divine knowledge, their love of God and their dedication to ministry and leadership will benefit the greater church as a whole and therefore, all of us.



JUSTPEACE New England Synod Webinar

Creation Cares - Green Team

A synod team put together an online panel and with my passionate heart for creation care I chose to listen. One of our members, retired Pastor John Stendahl, was on the panel. We were encouraged to come together, to start asking questions about what we have been learning about climate change and our experiences with our pandemic crisis. How are they connected and how are we being changed as we move into our new future life together? Learning from science on how to care for creation was emphasized. There was also a vision for 50 creation cares congregations to begin to work together. The question for us now is, how much do we want to become involved?

I am suggesting that we form a Creation Care's Green Team at St. Peter's. There are materials to read, conversations to begin, educational programs to be held and relationships to be developed. A small group is needed which can give input to the JustPeace team and to Council. It is time to move beyond out solar panels, composting, types of tableware for shared meals and choices in communion cups.

I have also been participating in meetings with an active Cape Cod group, Faith Communities Environmental Network (FCEN) for the past 6 months. This is a group of 24 faith communities coming together (recently via Zoom) for education, advocacy and sharing of best practices with primary application to our life together on the Cape. There is much talent anb energy in that group. Would you like to see our congregation join this group?

We have come to the point of needing more leadership from St. Peter's than I can offer alone. The JustPeace team would therefore like to hear from any members willing to join with us. 

- Praying our Praise






St. Peter's Walking Group
