#### Reflections on the Psalms and our Sabbatical

If you could compile a collection of the prayers you have prayed over the course of your life, from childhood to present, whether out loud or in the silence of your heart, whether alone or with others, what would stand out? Do they reflect the worst and best times of your life, your deepest losses as well as your greatest joys? If someone could read or hear our prayers 100 years from now, what would they learn about us? What would they learn about our relationship with God, God's presence and movement in our lives?

The Psalms are often referred to as the Prayer Book within the scripture. One can study the psalms and their structures, and categorize them generally as psalms of lament or praise. More specifically, one can find wisdom psalms, creation psalms, imprecatory psalms (expressing anger and confusion over incomprehensible or undeserved suffering), royal psalms, psalms of trust, and psalms of enthronement. More simply put, the psalms are the prayers of the people of God. They are our prayers. They reflect every possible human emotion and bring them all before God. Commenting on the psalm laments, scholar Pierre Wolff would have us ask of ourselves: "Do we love God enough to tell all?" Patrick Miller, whom Tiffany and I had as a professor at Princeton Seminary said, "The psalms speak both for us and to us something of God's way with us."

On our Sabbatical we had the opportunity to study the psalms with Luther Seminary Old Testament Scholar Rolf Jacobsen. We read one of his books and then met with him individually for five hours over several days. We had the opportunity to experience the psalms in daily worship by going on retreat to Benedictine monasteries in Minnesota and California. Benedictines live by the motto "Prayer and work;" they also place great value on hospitality. Monastic worship follows the "Liturgy of the Hours" where one prays Vigils, Lauds (morning prayers), Mass, Vespers (evening prayer), Compline (night prayer). Much of this worship involves chanting the psalms. This provided more than enough opportunity for worship immersion! Tiffany and I also focused on our own creative disciplines: for me this meant having the space and time to write poetry and prayers in the style of the psalms, for Tiffany this meant creating a daily visual-arts journal based on the psalms.



## View From the Deck

Sabbatical offered other surprises as well, an opportunity to see the George Floyd Square and memorial, witnessing both grief and hope. We had the opportunity to share a meal with Luther Seminary's president and hear about her reflections about a changing Church. We were able to visit the Museum of Tolerance in Los Angeles. We also had opportunities for some recreational renewal, kayaking on the Mississippi, sailing in Buzzards Bay, and taking many walks wherever we were. Following the stress of a Covid year (2 years?!), adjusting to being "empty nesters," Sabbatical offered an opportunity for refreshment, reflection and renewal. In short, we want to say, "THANK YOU." Over the coming year, we hope to use the psalms in new ways, offer new studies and creative opportunities for the congregation to engage and immerse in the psalms more deeply, this wonderful prayerbook that invites us into a deeper understanding of ourselves, and a deeper relationship with God.



An architecture graduate from Birzeit University, I specialize in preserving historical buildings that hold the Palestinian identity within its stones. I'm a volunteer at Alrowwad Cultural and Arts Society in so many different activities and programs, including Dabka dance, theater, and social programs that target children and youth in the Palestinian society. Alrowwad Cultural and Arts Society is one of the most outstanding NGOs in the Palestinian community, where it covers all fields of interests. This includes arts, theater, music, culture, and social fields. Me being part of this society gave me the opportunity to build my personality and to widen my knowledge. One of the most outstanding programs Alrowwad does is the student fund program in partnership with Tree of Life, that covers university students' tuitions. I was



one of the beneficiaries of this program where Alrowwad help me not only with my school tuition, but also with my transportation and accommodation expenses. By which this program was the helping hand for me for plenty of my semesters, and made it easier for my parents to help me with my studies. I could never be more grateful for Alrowwad's major help ever since my childhood and my adulthood. Alrowwad helped me finding my interests, shaping my personality and in making me the engineer I am today. My deep thanks to Alrowwad and Tree of Life.

We welcomed a family seeking asylum from Cuba on November 15<sup>th</sup>, 3 days after meeting them on Zoom, 6 days after they crossed the border, and 3 months after they started their 13 -country journey from S. America (Uruguay).

We have a group of 19 Accompaniment volunteers, most from St. Peter's congregation, but also from several other congregation, trained in September, whom Safe Harbors is sponsoring. Together, our welcome and accompaniment teams are helping the family (who are not allowed to apply for a work authorization until about 6 months after their asylum application, but are in the US legally) to settle in to the home we are leasing. We are providing them with clothing, food, transportation, assistance in accessing health, mental health, dental and eye services, helping them to find an experienced immigration attorney, and educating them about our culture. We are learning from each other, and have become familiar with google/translate, and wonderful organizations like the Family Pantry. Our Safe Harbors rented home is fully furnished, and located a few blocks from a park, and from the bike trail, and the dad, Adail, got a broken bike in the garage fixed and usable on the first day! We are not currently recruiting volunteers until at least 2022, but appreciate your financial and community support.

If you speak Spanish, we could use more volunteers with some Spanish skills for certain tasks, Adail, Lisvania and 'almost' 2 year-old Keilany attended our service last week and felt welcomed, even though only Lisvania speaks some English We are thankful to meet them and appreciated the "Bienvenido" from the congregation last week.

### Through the Lens of Science with Doug...

Did you know the Latin derivation of "solstice" is "sun-still" and the derivation of "equinox" is "equal-night"? The Earth's winter solstice falls on December 22 when its axis is tilted away from the sun causing sunlight to strike the earth at an angle in the northern hemisphere causing temperatures to decrease. The summer solstice falls on June 22 when its axis is tilted towards the sun causing sunlight to fall directly onto the Tropic of Cancer 23.4° north of the equator. The equinoxes of March 22 and September 22 occur when the sun shines directly onto the equator causing 12 hours of sunlight and 12 hours of darkness everywhere on earth. That happens on the Earth is halfway between its two solstices. The 2021 Winter Solstice will occur on December 21<sup>st.</sup>

The word "stice" (still) describes what the sun looks like when it reaches the end of its apparent motion across the western horizon from north to south in the fall and south to the north in the spring. On June 22, the sun sets at about 305° on the northwest horizon (the summer solstice), and it appears to remain at that bearing until it begins moving southward along the western horizon. In other words, the sun appears to be **still** on June 22. For the next six months, the sun moves southward until it comes to another still position at 235° in the southwest when it sets on December 22 (the winter solstice). On the eastern horizon, the sun rises over the northeast at a 55° bearing on June 22, then on December 22, it rises over the southeast at a bearing of 125°.

The above bearings and dates are based on my 41° North latitude which gives a span of sunlight on the western horizon between 235° and 305°. On the eastern horizon the span would fall between 55° and 125°. The total span is about 70° on each horizon. In conclusion, seasons are a function of the Earth's tilt of 23.4°. The less the tilt, the less the change there would be. The more the tilt, the more severe seasonal change would be.

#### PASTOR'S RESPONSE BY CHRISTIAN HOLLECK

Doug describes summer and winter solstices and how the angle at which the earth is tilted towards the sun affects our seasons. Most of us, even without understanding all the science, experience the changes in temperature and daylight. We notice how the sun rises and sets in a different place on the horizon in summer and winter. We notice the shorter daylight hours and the more pronounced shadows. We hold a special worship service on the "Longest Night" of the year. Here are three scriptural references to the sun you may not be familiar with:

Sun- a supernatural phenomenon: "On the day the Lord gave the Amorites over to Israel... The sun stopped in the middle of the sky and delayed going down about a full day... (Joshua 10:12, 13)"

Sun as metaphor for God : "For the Lord God is a sun and shield; the Lord bestows favor and honor... (Ps.84:11)

Sun as metaphor for Jesus, the Son of Man"His face was like the sun, shining in all its brilliance. (Rev.1:16)"

God shines brighter than the sun: "The sun will no more be your light by day, nor will the brightness of the moon shine on you, for the Lord will be your everlasting light, and your God will be your glory. Your sun will never set again, and your moon will wane no more; the Lord will be your everlasting light, and your days of sorrow will end. (Isaiah 60:19)."

Notes from the Council Meeting of November 16

Officers and Pastors' reports highlights:

The Treasurer reported that actual October income is

\$24,616.47 with \$21,452.42 from offerings. Facilities use is

higher due to Chatham Chorale and Spaulding exercise group. Net Operating deficit is \$6507.22 compared to projected deficit of \$25,473.90.

November 14. They are working to welcome the new music minister Maggie Ribb. New members will be received on November 21.

Council meeting business highlights:

3. Ruth Brenneman will be replacing Aline Glifort who is retiring as Loaves and Fishes Food Pantry manager. The Council would like to thank Aline for her many years of dedicated service.

4. Safe Harbors Ministry has received a family of 3 including a 2-year old child from Cuba to sponsor. They arrived on November 15 and are residing in the rental house. Volunteers pulled together food and supplies quickly. Spanish speaking volunteers would be helpful.

5. Broad Reach Hospice Bereavement Group for people who have lost spouses or children will be meeting weekly on Tuesday afternoons in the church building. Ministry team reports highlights:

2. JustPeace/Reconciling in Christ is finishing Hope for the Holidays Christmas card project and noted that a donation for aid to Afghanistan was made.


