Blue Christmas Worship on Sunday, December 17 at 11:15 am

Please note that this year, St. Peter's will offer a Blue Christmas worship service instead of the "Longest Night" service. Numerous strands of Christian traditions converge in a service that acknowledges the reality of darkness (pain, heartbreak, loss of loved ones, personal setbacks, etc.) while pointing to the light that cannot be extinguished (Jesus' life, death, and resurrection) that provides both assurance and hope.

Some say the service puts Christ back into Christmas. It is so much more. The service proclaims community, promise, healing, and mystery to those of us that feel separated or isolated by the various and sundry inroads of faith.

As Rishi Shukla recently wrote, "Attendees find solace....in the music and message that acknowledges that not everyone celebrates with unbridled joy. They sense communion, realizing they are not alone in their feelings. The traditions woven into these services serve as a gentle reminder that the holiday season can be navigated with grace, even amidst the complexities of the emotional terrain."

COVENANT FOR INTENTIONAL INTERIM PASTOR The Pastor agrees:

It is my privilege to support the mission and ministry of St Peter's Lutheran Church in Harwich, MA, as intentional interim pastor.

In prayerful conversation with the Congregation Council I have discussed the Healthy Transitions policies and expectations of the New England Synod, ELCA, and I enter into the following covenant:

Pastor Roger Dennis agrees:

- + to pray for my predecessors in their new ministry for the sake of the mission of the church;
- + to speak well of my predecessors with respect as siblings in Christ and valued pastoral colleagues;
- + to assist the members of the congregation to find comfort and come to closure after the departure of my predecessors;
- + to engage the congregation in the developmental tasks of intentional interim ministry;
- + to preach and preside at all regular liturgies of the congregation, to provide pastoral care to members and pastoral leadership for the meetings and activities of the congregation.
- + to be responsible for the parish records;
- + to communicate regularly with the congregation and with the Office of the Bishop as to the progress of the interim work.
- + to make clear to all concerned that my service as intentional interim pastor excludes me from consideration for the regularly called pastorate of this congregation;
- + to engage the congregation in the developmental tasks specific to this congregation, as identified by the council:
- 1. Acknowledge the appointment as intentional interim minister as full-time, preach and preside each Sunday during extent of this Covenant with exception of 4 weeks of vacation days, work remotely from home off-Cape on weekdays one week out of four, and be available by phone, email, or Zoom on remote days.
- 2. Participate actively in monthly and ad hoc Congregation Council and monthly Council Officers' meeting to set agenda and provide a monthly Interim Pastoral Progress Report to Council.
- 3. Participate actively in Finance and Worship Committee regular meetings.
- 4. Provide leadership and pastoral input to paid church staff (minister of music, administrator, business/fiscal administrator, and custodian) through participation in weekly staff meetings, review of draft documents and communications, and periodic mentoring. Participate in periodic Staff Support team meetings in person, by Zoom, or through conversation with team chair.

- 5. Coordinate annual paid staff evaluations, ad hoc requests for time off, and other supervisory or disciplinary actions with Staff Support committee and Council.
- 6. Review 2022 Annual Meeting document, and work with Council, paid staff, and lay leadership to prepare for and participate in Congregation Annual Meeting.
- 7. Coordinate preparation of 2023 Congregational Annual Report and other reports to the Synod.
- 8. Meet with congregational members to update congregation's constitution and submit it to the Synod.
- 9. Meet with leadership of church tenants (Cape Cod Christian Academy and Saint Mary Magdala Ecumenical Catholic Church) soon after arrival, and coordinate with church staff and council liaison on any problem assessment to work towards solutions.
- 10. Acknowledge differences in the congregation regarding the acquisition and installation of the new organ, meet with chairs of Planning and Construction Team and Pipes for Praise soon after arrival, and participate when feasible. Review minutes of meetings and provide ongoing pastoral input.
- 11. Facilitate more efficient financial reporting and a resolving of differences of the financial team.
- 12. For all other active ministries and committees (Pastoral Care, Safe Harbors, JustPeace, Spiritual Formation, Property, Stewardship, Welcome, etc.) make contact with leaders and/or council liaison to identify ongoing accomplishments, barriers, and concerns.
- 13.Meet periodically with Transition Team chair or team to facilitate staff and congregational support of the transition process.

The Congregation Agrees:

- + to support the work and ministry of the intentional interim pastor and to pray for him/her and the congregation's transitional tasks
- + to adopt the developmental tasks outlined above
- + to begin the call process for settled pastor only after the interim ministry goals and developmental tasks have been adequately achieved
- + to pay the intentional interim pastor according to synod compensation guidelines.

Effective dates of this Covenant: November 6, 2023 – November 5, 2024. This covenant may be terminated by either party with 30 days written notice.

The good news is that as of September 30, 2023, we projected a Budget deficit of \$49,909.37. The actual deficit is -\$ 1,344.74.

Financial Status October 31, 2023

The profit and loss Financial Statement for October has not been submitted to council; however, our Year-to-Date Balance is back in the black \$7,526.17.

We have 95 Estimates of Giving for 2023 for a total of \$281,251. towards a goal of \$280,000.

Pledged amounts through October should be \$234,375.83 vs. the amount received of \$237,233.28 which puts us ahead by \$2,857.45.

Non-pledge amounts though October are estimated at \$29,166.67, and we have received \$20,880.00. We are behind by -\$8,286.67 in non-pledge giving. So, our net year-to-date envelope giving is behind by \$8,286.67 in ad by -\$5,429.22.

St. Peter's Pipes for Praise: Fundraising has received gifts as of October of \$275,731.16 and the reserve from the General Fund has been reduced to \$74.268.84.

The available General Fund after the organ project reserve and the projected budget deficit is \$264,481.84 and the Designated Reserve Fund balance is \$44,200.67.

Nauset Interfaith Association's Response to Middle East Crisis

We watched in horror on October 7 as Hamas carried out a terror attack against the Jewish people of Israel. We condemn this action, and our hearts are heavy with grief for the many who suffered loss. We stand with and extend our love to our neighbors in Am HaYam Havurah, praying along with those who have loved ones in Israel, and for the release of all hostages. We also commit ourselves to stand against those in this country who would pursue acts of antisemitism during these dark days.

We grieve equally for the suffering people of Gaza, recognizing that all of us are children of God. Our hearts tell us that answers are to be found not in violence, and we abhor the deaths of innocent men, women and children on both sides. We pray for a cessation of this conflict, and for peace with justice for both Israelis and Palestinians. We also stand with our Muslim neighbors, and deplore the presence of Islamophobia in any form.

We recognize that among our various faith communities, differences of opinion will exist over what is the faithful way forward in this crisis. But let us together at this time affirm the strength of our interfaith bonds, and stand against all hateful words and actions.

Food Pantry Update

Loaves and Fish Pantry

Thanks to a dedicated and growing Loaves and Fishes Pantry team for keeping everything running smoothly while I was recuperating from knee replacement. They were amazing. November and December are always busy because many of our families return or use the pantry more often because they find it difficult once heating bills go up.

There have been so many things going on besides our regular pantry shopping hours. Almost 100 coats provided by <u>OperationWarm.org</u> have been delivered, bundled into family orders and most have been distributed. Then on November 17, thirty- seven turkeys with fixings were passed out.

Currently we are signing up families for a special Lower Cape Outreach Council event allowing parents to select gifts for their children during the week of December 11. All of the donations are used for children of the clients served by the 9 LCOC pantries. Last month our Loaves and Fishes pantry provided food for over 75 different children and we think of them as a part of our St. Peter's family. Thanks to our generous congregation, over 5 bags of gifts have been collected and we will have the bin out until Sunday, December 10. Any toys, games, stuffed animals, new clothing or craft items are needed. Shopping for teens is more difficult so gift cards are always useful. Target, Old Navy, CVS, Marshalls, TJ Maxx and Amazon or VISA cards are just a few that have been very popular.

Brown paper grocery bags are desperately needed so please clean your closets out and drop them in our barrels. Although we have had to limit the number of groceries that families can take each visit, we estimate that we use over 800 bags a month. Thanks for caring and keeping our neighbors fed!

Through the Lens of Science with Doug...

Ancient Celestial Observatories

Over 5,000 years ago, a religious cult named the Druids from southwest England, decided to worship their God and heavenly bodies in the sky. They envisioned tall monuments between which celestial bodies could be observed. It took over a thousand years to locate and haul many tons of blue stones from quarries located in Wales (Southern UK). Hundred of men pulled on long, leather ropes, tied to huge sledges on rollers, transporting tons of stones over land to Amesbury, UK. Deep, square holes were dug in the ground of chalk. Another 1,000 years went by before any monuments were erected, but during that time, Neolithic residents of the Orkney Islands in northeastern Scotland began building temples and monuments such as the King of Brodgar, probably the earliest known celestial observatory. It must have been these craftsmen that inspired the Druids to build Stonehenge in southern Britain. The Orkney monuments were discovered many decades after the Druid monuments were discovered because the Orkney Islands are much farther north, close to 60 degrees latitude.

The building of Stonehenge was accomplished in three phases over a period of 1,700 years or 1.5 million working days involving about 1,000 men at a time! Phase 1 began in about 2750 BC nearly 200 years before the Egyptians began building pyramids. The Druids constructed a circle of six-foot high stones, 380 feet in diameter, surrounding a ditch. Then they built a second circle of stones inside the ditch. On the northeast side of Stonehenge, there is a sixteen foot high stone known as the Heel Stone. Standing in the center of the inner circle, you can see the sun rise over this stone on midsummer's day. Phase 2 began about 2100 BC when 80 more stones were erected in Stonehenge's center. Phase 3 lasted from 2000 to 1100 BC. Bronze agers removed the inner circle of stones, replacing them with thirty 13-foot high sandstone uprights, topping them with horizontal lintels so they could watch the sun as it appeared to move back and forth, north and south, across the horizon.

All during the construction phases, ancient observers kept records of seasonal changes making Stonehenge become an ancient celestial observatory at 52 degrees N latitude. Today the observatory is a popular tourist attraction visited by people from all over the world.

Pastor Dennis' Commentary: Observing the heavens has and will continue adding to our understanding of the unknown. Science and faith are not mutually exclusive. The Psalms and the story of the three wise men, of which numerous scholars were astrologers, among other Scripture readings, speak of the ancients utilizing the heavens to discover or interpret signs of God's activity in human affairs.
