#### From the Pastor

It's when we face for a moment
the worst our kind can do, and shudder to know
the taint in our own selves, that awe
cracks the mind's shell and enters the heart:
not to a flower, not to a dolphin,
to no innocent form
but to this creature vainly sure
it and no other is god-like, God
(out of compassion for our ugly
failure to evolve) entrusts,
as guest, as brother,
the Word. "On the Mystery of the Incarnation." Denise Levertov

**Advent**. Every year, as the daylight hours grow shorter and shorter, we begin again with a new liturgical year. Fall makes way for winter, and we find ourselves in wonder at the birth of God into our human world.

The word Advent comes from the Latin *ad-venire*, meaning "to come." Similar to the season of Lent in the spring, this is a time of preparation. We are called to be ready, alert, and not distracted by the ways of the world. What are we waiting for—what do we hope will come? The birth of Jesus, the arrival of Christ in our hearts, and the ultimate return as promised in prophecy. And as we wait, we pray: *O come*, *O come*, *Emmanuel*.

Advent also requires us to confront that which is not "God-with-us" in our world and in ourselves. As we come face-to-face with the "one little Word that will save us all"—the infant Jesus—we can't help but remember, as Denise Levertov writes, "the worst our kind can do."

I will admit that Advent is not a season in which I want to "call a thing what it is," as Martin Luther asserts in his *Heidelberg Disputation*. Carols, candles, and Christmas don't exactly set the stage for rumination on the Theology of the Cross. Truthful self-assessment seems most appropriate for Lent. And yet—unhealthy self-deprecation aside—I'm with Luther as he frames Advent not as a sentimental time when we gush with wide-eyed longing for the hoped-for return of Christ the King. Rather, it's a time to proclaim the Good News as forcefully as we might, remembering that God's action is toward us and not the other way around. Luther writes:

Without a doubt, you do not come to Him and fetch Him; He is too high and too far from you. With your effort, pains, and work you cannot reach Him, lest you boast that you had brought Him to yourself by your own merit and worthiness. No dear friend, all merit and worthiness is defeated here, and there is nothing on your side but demerit and unworthiness; on His side, nothing but grace and mercy. ("Postil on Romans 13:11–14," American Edition: Luther's Works 75:33)

This Advent—our first together as people and pastor—my hope is that, as Levertov asserts, our mutual "awe cracks the mind's shell and enters the heart"; that in our daily repentance our faith would grow, and our bodies would consistently pray: *Come, Lord Jesus, come.*

Council had a special meeting on November 12, 2025 to make a decision regarding the sale of the lot we own on Round Cove Road. Jim Merriam was our meeting guest: he discussed the history of the lot and zoning rules in Harwich. We had received six bids; five were from builders / contractors and one was from The Harwich Conservation Commission. After some discussion it was decided (unanimously) to counter The Harwich Conservation Commission's bid of \$319,000 at \$330,000 and with a response deadline of Friday, December 14 at noon. Much to my surprise, my phone rang at 8 am on Thursday with Jim Merriam reporting a positive response from The Harwich Conservation Commission. The closing will be on December 12, 2025. This is certainly a positive outcome and will maintain this property as undeveloped with access to the conservation area behind our land.

In December please join me in welcoming Pastor Christephor Gilbert and his husband, Donald to our church family. Looking forward to new energy for services and caring leadership as we move ahead to serve the Lord and our missions here at St. Peter's!


#### December 7 Book Signing Coffee Hour and Welcome to Pastor Gilbert

A big THANK YOU to Paul Bongfeld for getting St. Peter's involved in the Thrivent FEEDNE2025 challenge and for all of you for hauling in bags and bags of needed items. The many donations kept the shelves stocked for the critical weeks when we had long periods without a delivery, along with reduced food availability from the Food Bank, yet record numbers of pantry visits. We were excited to learn that the Loaves and Fishes Pantry was picked to receive one of the \$500 awards!!!! This will go a long way to get us get through the Holidays, but we hope you will keep looking for grocery deals to share.

It was obvious that families were very concerned about how they would manage keeping food on the table. The Lower Cape Outreach Council ("LCOC") gave us some statistics that were eye opening. There are 2,723 SNAP recipient households in the nine towns that LCOC services. Of those, 774 are in Harwich which helps explain why we had 77 shoppers the first week in November.

Not only have we provided hundreds of bags of groceries and produce this past month, our volunteers have signed up clients for coats and Thanksgiving dinners. LCOC purchases coats at a reduced cost from Operation Warm and our volunteers took orders, sorted, and passed out 98 winter coats. On November 21, the fixings for almost 80 Thanksgiving dinners were distributed here at St. Peter's, double the number from last year. The need is here, right in Harwich.

Now we are on to the Santa Stop sign up and collection of gift cards, toys, and new clothing items. Our families can sign up for a voucher that allows them to pick out items for their children. We love that these gifts go directly to "our" families. A bin will be located in the lobby after Thanksgiving through Sunday, December 14. Gift cards to stores like TJ Maxx, Marshalls, CVS, Target, Old Navy, etc. can be put in the pantry mailbox or dropped off in the bin in a larger envelope. Thanks for opening up your hearts to our neighbors in need.

#### PRAYER SHAWL MINISTRY



#### In Defense of Immigrants

We are a nation of immigrants. We know not one of us would be here were it not for the courage of our forebears who left their native lands—whether through fear or desire, compulsion or ambition—to emigrate to the United States. Until the early 20th century, the U.S. had a more or less open border policy; but in the course of the last 100 years, quotas and other restrictions have been legislated. It seems now that we have turned our backs on immigrants. A mere 7,500 refugees will be admitted in 2026, with preference given for white South Africans.

Immigrants already here live in fear of ICE arrests which are on the increase, sweeping up legal residents as well as undocumented refugees. In a time of such disarray, with policies changing daily, it seems there is little we can do to bring about change. Just the opposite is true! Hundreds of efforts are currently being made throughout the country–from the courts, to state legislatures, to immigrant coalitions, churches, charities, food pantries, all the way down to individual acts of kindness–to help and protect those refugees already among us.

In Massachusetts an important bill–*The Immigrant Legal Defense Act*– has been introduced in the House (H. 1954) and Senate (S. 1127) https://malegislature.gov/Bills/194/H1954. It would appropriate funds to provide no-cost legal defense to immigrants who live and work in Massachusetts who are in imminent risk of deportation. According to a fact sheet supplied by MIRA (Massachusetts Immigrant and Refugee Advocacy Coalition), 55% of sanctuary seekers are unable to afford a lawyer and must face a higher risk of losing their case. Those with legal representation are 10 times more likely to win a positive outcome. The MIRA website offers information on taking action in a number of ways, including how to contact our legislators https://miracoalition.org/

The Just Peace Committee is committed to finding ways to help our brothers and sisters, just as our ancestors were helped in their great transition to a new country. Thus we persevere, with efforts great and small, to follow Jesus' teaching to "Welcome the Stranger."

#### The BIRTH of the EARTH

The Earth was born about 4.6 billion years ago from clouds of gas and dust surrounding the early sun. Dust in swirling clouds collided and coalesced to create our embryonic world. Our atmosphere was cold and dark as meteoroids bombarded the Earth. As the Earth's interior compacted under gravity and heat generated by radioactive elements, iron sank to the Earth's core, and lighter elements such as silicon and aluminum created an outer layer of molten rock, belching hot gases into space. As the Earth cooled, the outer rock congealed to form a brittle crust allowing magma to surge upwards by volcanic action spreading magma out into vast sheets creating early continents.

The early Earth was a vision of hell with scalding rock and choking fumes. The sun was faint and the moon looked immense, because its distance from Earth was only one tenth of today's distance. Many millions of years passed before the Earth was fit for any kind of life. It took 700 million years for plants and oceans to appear. Canopies of rain fell the Earth only to be boiled back into the atmosphere as steam. It took another thousand years before sunlight could penetrate cloud cover. The Earth's crust cooled from 2,000 to 200 degrees while massive thunderstorms occurred. Volcanic rocks eroded into sand, mud, and sedimentary layers of soil. As the rains fell, blue-green algae trapped sunlight that created photosynthesis making oxygen fill the air to combine with nitrogen that was already there. Oxygen created ozone in the upper atmosphere that absorbed dangerous radiation from the sun. This made surface water safe for the emergence of primitive life.

Gravity arranged matter of different densities into separate layers of iron and nickel in the Earth's core as big as our moon with temperatures reaching 10,0000 degrees F. Next to the inner core is the liquid metal outer core surrounded by the Earth's mantle, the outer layers of which act like silly putty. The next outer layer contains 200 miles of molten rock called the asthenosphere that lies just under the lithosphere that contains tectonic plates that float above the asthenosphere. The final 25 mile thick layer is the crust that we live on.

The decay of radioactive Uranium has proven the Earth's crust solidified 4 billion years ago. Four miles below the crust is the deepest depth that's been penetrated. Geologists are trying to drill all the way through the Earth's crust. For every 60 feet of depth below the ground, the temperature rises one degree of Fahrenheit. Below 30 miles, the temperature rises one degree of Fahrenheit. Below 30 miles the temperature reaches 2,200 degrees, the boiling point of most rocks. Today God is putting the finishing touches onto our planet to make it safe for all of us.
