Pastoral Perceptions

The upcoming months, spanning the entire Lenten season, will be unlike any recent years in St. Peter's history. Sanctuary renovations to accommodate the new organ and other projects will call for worship to be held elsewhere. However, this time can provide an opportunity to strengthen our spiritual discipline.

What? How can the introduction of chaos (construction), upheaval (change in location of worship), and disruption (change in my worship routines) strengthen our spiritual discipline?

Psychologists and other human behaviorists tell us that when things change in our life, it can impact our mental health and well-being. One may even feel out of control in situations that are unexpected or not viewed favorably. However, learning to manage the way we deal with these different situations will benefit our mental health. When good or bad change happens in our life, one needs to make an adjustment. Using healthy adjustment methods will help prevent negative effects on our mental and spiritual health. One's outlook affects how one deals with new situations. If one has a negative outlook on life, major changes may worsen these feelings. The opposite is true as well.

Lent is an intentional time of reflection and preparation. Prayer, fasting, almsgiving, worship, and reflection on the life, death, and resurrection of Jesus (God's gift to us) are traditional disciplines that aid in realizing what is important and to help us rise above the distractions, upheavals, and the chaotic periods of life. Over the next couple of months, let us remain focused upon whom we worship, why we worship, and God's presence in both our worship and personal lives. Amen.

The 2024 Lenten theme is *“Heresy and other Theological Conundrums.”* Heresy is a belief that is against the principles of a particular religion. Heresy is more than hypocrisy. Starting on Wednesday, February 21, there will be a Lenten service at noon through Wednesday, March 20. Please join us!



Lutheran Immigration and Refugee Service

The Lutheran Immigration and Refugee Service changed its name to “Global Refuge” on January 14. The mission, values, and vision remain the same. One can watch a short video explaining the change here:

To Pause at the Threshold: Reflections on Living on the Border

**A Lenten Easter Study Opportunity Led by Stewart Pattison
Sundays from March 3 to April 14 (not on Easter Sunday)**

I will be leading a six-week Lenten-Easter study-reflection group on the theme of The "Thresholds." We will meet in the Luther Room after the service ends. I will draw on the reflections of the contemplative Esther de Waal in her book, To Pause at the Threshold: Reflections on Living on the Border. The border is that of England and Wales which she develops as a metaphor for the movements of the spiritual life. We cross many thresholds daily, often unaware that we are doing so. By becoming mindful of these crossing points, I hope to introduce spiritual practices which will deepen awareness of the love of God for us in even the most routine activities. The class will build toward Holy Week and the great threshold of Jesus' death and resurrection. By identifying our thresholds with those of Jesus, we will find that there is no moment of life that is untouched by the Cross and the Empty Tomb.

My approach is shaped by a three-year certificate course in Spiritual Formation and a two-year certificate course in Spiritual Direction, both from Columbia Theological Seminary (PCUSA). I also meet monthly with a Spiritual Direction Peer Supervision group. If you have questions, please email me at stewartepattison@gmail.com.

Organ Update:

(1) From the Planning and Construction Team

Renovations to the sanctuary necessary to accommodate the pipe organ will begin “mid-February” and will likely require four to six weeks to complete. During construction, the sanctuary will be closed, and Sunday services and other activities will be relocated to the Fellowship Hall. Live-streaming of Sunday worship will continue during the renovations. Paul Bongfeldt or another member of the Planning and Construction Team (PACT) will provide updates following Sunday services. The members of the PACT recognize that the closure of the sanctuary will create challenges, and they appreciate your flexibility, patience, and support.

Please note that Sunday services will return to the sanctuary once the renovations are completed. However, the pipe organ will not likely not be installed until August 2024.

On January 14, the Chatham Chorale presented an organ fund-raising benefit concert called “*Singing for Pipes*” in the St. Peter’s Lutheran Church sanctuary. The program consisted of the following organ, piano and choral pieces with Craig Tocher playing the organ; Donald Enos playing the piano; and Chatham Chorale Music Director, Joe Marchio, providing commentary and history about the selections:

“Who Knew?” A Dulcimer Story

“Be not afraid, I go before you always....” -Bob Dufford SJ

Just before Christmas, when the dulcimer fellowship group met, we welcomed a newcomer, Paul. He was a great addition to our fledgling group and a “quick study.” I learned that he split his time between Cape Cod and New York. He was planning to be in New York for the holidays but returning to the Cape in the New Year. When we didn’t see him the first few Sundays, I wrote to find out if he was indeed back on the Cape, and to offer him one of the loaner dulcimers that had been returned. He responded that his mother had become seriously ill and was hospitalized. He would need to stay in New York to be with her. I wrote back that I was sorry to hear this and would keep him and his mother in my prayers. A week later, I received another email from Paul with this picture and the subject line: “Who knew?” Paul wrote *“My mom is in St Joseph’s Hospital. This statue greets me every morning. Who knew he played the dulcimer?!”*

Indeed, while most would see a statue of St. Joseph the Carpenter, Paul sees in his pose and serenity a prayerful dulcimer player. Paul wrote that when he sees this statue, he is reminded of *“God’s love, and that the world he made is huge....I hear the strings, and not the ‘beeping’ of the hospital machines.”*

In February, the dulcimer fellowship group will meet in the Luther Room on Wednesday February 7 at 4 pm OR Sunday February 11 after church (note: the



second Sunday is just this month). The goal of the group is not to perform but to make music and connections, to laugh and marvel at the sweet simplicity of these three stringed instruments, and to take time out from all that we are afraid of, knowing God is present in it all. Food Pantry Update

Loaves and Fish Pantry

It seems that every time I stop by the pantry, there are a few surprise items in the barrels or already put on the shelves by our amazing team of volunteers. These items that you drop off really make a difference. Our numbers are typically lower in January and February with many of our seasonal workers going off Cape. We still have families who aren't able to go to work in other areas during the quiet Cape Cod winter season, especially those with school-age children. They need our support more than ever. We hope that the increasing cost of running a household during the winter can be offset by a trip to our pantry.

We had to drastically limit the amount of food each client could take but our plan is to be able to increase these limits, especially for families and seniors who often find it difficult to get to the pantry weekly during the winter months. The money from donations and the Cranberry Fair have allowed us to purchase more, especially perishable items. A big thanks to Claudia Bellis who keeps an eye out for sales here and even in Connecticut. Every can of soup, box of pasta, or check donated to the pantry shows that the St. Peter's family and friends care about our neighbors. The Food Pantry will be closed on Monday, February 19 for Presidents Day.

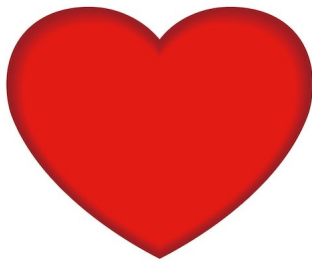
PRAYER SHAWL MINISTRY

Children's Sunday School

Megan Kaser, Judy Langelier and Kayden Kaser are having fun leading our small, but mighty group of eager St. Peter's Sunday School learners. Our main goal is to have fun as we simplify Bible studies and connect hands-on activities to enhance their understanding. We've seen that food, fun, creativity and outdoor playtime have led to our lesson's success! Our greatest blessing is to see these kids excited to come back and learn more! Some of our lesson highlights:

- Jesus feeds 5,000 with the generosity of a young boy's food offering of fish and bread. In our case, we used goldfish and bread.
- To recreate Solomon's temple, we used graham crackers, cookies and lots of icing.
- Four friends lesson, we turned heavy whipping cream into butter to teach what a little patience and faith can do.
- Baby Moses: we tested what sweet goodies can float in our delicious hot chocolates and created mini boats out of tinfoil to test how many pennies it could withstand before sinking.

A Cosmos of Modified Gravity

An explanation of why gravity exists in the universe has been perplexing. We **feel** it, scientist **measure** it, but the real nature of gravity was unknown until Einstein proved gravity is **not** a force but instead a function of the curvature of time and space as it was revealed in his theory of relativity.

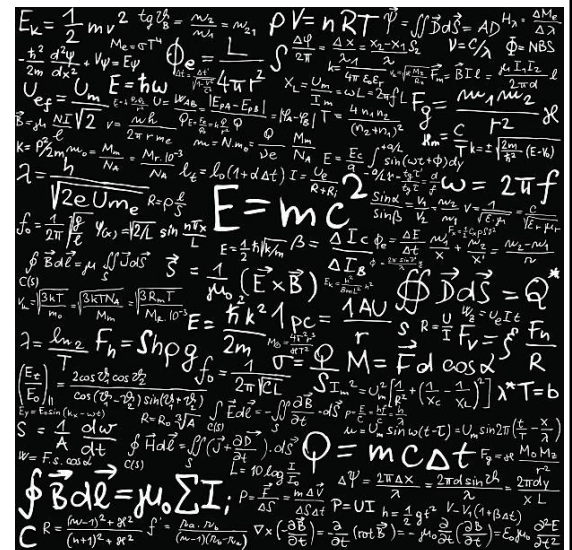
Galileo proved falling objects of different weights hit the ground at the same time. Sir Isaac Newton proposed the attraction between two objects is inversely proportional to the square of the distance between them. This is the formula scientists have used to measure gravity, but it fails to explain what causes the phenomenon.

Einstein explained the geometry of the universe causes all celestial bodies to accelerate as they speed through space trying to follow a straight line. Curved space distorts trajectories into gravitational waves, making all matter gravitate towards each other. It has only been recently that gravitational waves have been detected in space just as Einstein predicted.

For decades, cosmologists believed much of space consisted of dark matter, but Einstein's theory of relativity suggests such matter does not exist. The outer stars of galaxies orbit at speeds in accordance with the absence of dark matter. Modified gravity is an expression that now describes dark matter. 'Modified' reflects Einstein's gravity **without** a force and Newtonian gravity reflects gravity **with** a force! It appears Einstein's concept is the one cosmologists will rely on.

Force or no force, gravity **is** a function of mass. It's what holds us on the ground! On the moon, gravity would be only 1/6 of what you feel on Earth.

None of the above is new news to God!
It's the way it was designed!
