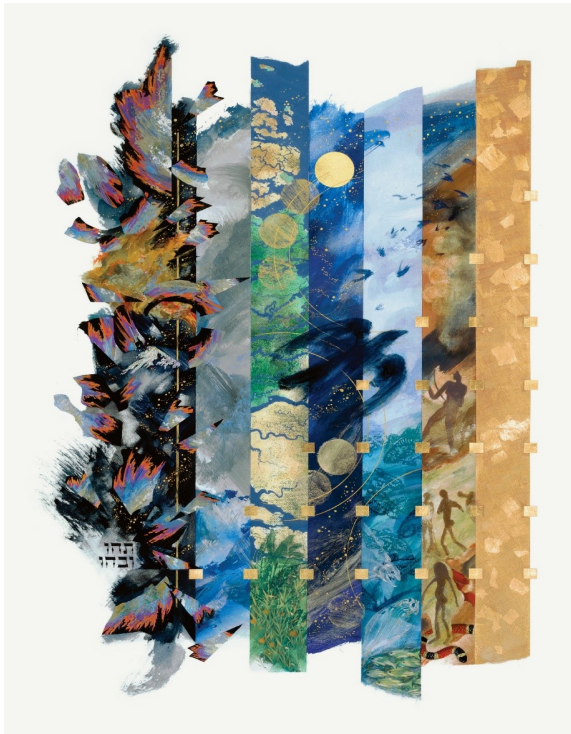
View From the Deck

For the past two months in these Network articles, I have been talking about the potential of having a Small Group Music Ministry program, particularly as we assess how we provide meaningful music for worship in the post-pandemic church. These groups would exist in parallel, or sometimes alone (as during the summertime) with our current music ministry groups, the Sanctuary Choir and St. Peter's Handbell Choir.

So far I haven't been swamped with phone calls, emails, or with people pounding down my office door volunteering for such an adventure!

So what gives?

I know there are talented people out there among us, whose gifts we could use.

If there was ever proof that a program such as this is something we as a worshipping community need, in a practical sense if not for the pure joy of hearing others' gifts as they grace worship, it was this past Sunday when myself and other members of the choir were not able to be in church out of an abundance of caution because of a COVID contact we had had off-Cape days before. Fortunately, through the willingness of the wife of the Pastor of the day, Suzanne Bassett, and our soloist, Lucy Brett, "music got done".

There will be a sign up area on the narthex kiosk so we can keep track of this new program, week by week during the summer. You can hear how confident I am of this, because I know that through invitation, and now being informed of the need for such a program, people will respond. We just need one commitment on the board, and I have confidence the program will grow from there.

Possible Trip to Holden Village! Are you interested?

After years of using *Holden Evening Prayer* for summer midweek worship we raised the question of whether we should visit Holden, and a number of you expressed interest. Holden Village is a remote Lutheran Retreat Center in the Cascade Mountains of Washington state.

Here's one way to think of it: What Calumet is to New England, Holden Village is to the United States! Holden Evening prayer was written in 1985-1986 by Marty Haugen when he was the musician in residence there. I believe it is still used there at least once a week.

Their website describes Holden: "Nestled in the mountains of the beautiful Glacier Peak Wilderness, Holden provides space for visitors to get back to basics. The Village welcomes all who seek rest and renewal to take part in daily rhythms of work, recreation, worship and shared meals with good company."

Pr. Tiffany and I were there years ago, when our girls were very young. We can attest that it is a place of incredible, breath-taking beauty. It is also rustic, remote, and challenging to get there- an adventure in and of itself: It takes 2 days, usually flight to Seattle, several hour bus ride and then overnight at a Bed & Breakfast, a 2-4 hour ferry ride up Lake Chelan (a 'must do' trip according to National Geographic), and finally an 11 mile 40 minute drive in a Holden vehicle.) There is no cell phone reception at Holden. Accommodations are generally two to a room with bathrooms down the hall. There are laundry facilities.



Here you can see what a typical day looks like in the summer: <http://www.holdenvillage.org/visit/day-hol/> We would adapt this for the fall, and for our age group; it would certainly include time for reflection, conversation, worship, hik-

ing and their art studios.

In the winter Holden gets an average of 270" of snow (last winter over 310"!). Hence we are looking at a **mid or late September visit**, 7 day trip with 5 nights at Holden Village. We need 15 people to go to make a group reservation (which includes discounts and a couple single rooms). The discounted group rate is \$85/night (this does not include airfare, bus, ferry, and the B & Breakfast). Right now, we are trying to get a sense of interest, and whether to make a preliminary St. Peter's group reservation to hold a spot in September. If there is interest we will communicate more information about content, exact dates, a much more specific cost estimate before asking for a firm commitment.

What do we believe? A study of the Creeds

We will offer one more workshop. We will look at the Augsburg Confession, formative for the Lutheran Church, and written primarily by Martin Luther's colleague Philip Melanchthon in 1530. We will also look at "A Brief Statement of Faith" (1991) of the Presbyterian Church USA. This statement of faith is unique for the ways it emphasizes not only Christ's birth and death but also ministry in Judea and Galilee, gender inclusiveness, and concern for the integrity of creation.

RECOMMENDATIONS FOR OUR PENTECOST LOVE OFFERING



Pentecost is a Greek word meaning "fiftieth day." It is the name used by Greek speaking Jews for the Hebrew "Feast of Harvest" or "Feast of Weeks." This celebration marked the beginning of the early wheat harvest, which meant it always fell sometime during the middle of the month of May or sometimes in early June. The people of Israel were commanded to appear at that time before the Lord. No one was to "appear empty handed," but all were to bring gifts in proportion to the way in which God had blessed them. Deuteronomy 16:17. In the Book of Acts, we read about the precious gift of God's Spirit poured out upon the church following Jesus' ascension to the right hand of God. The Holy Spirit, in turn, inspires the Church to exercise her gifts for the sake of the world God loves through service, witness and generous sharing of our wealth in proportion to God's generosity toward us.

With the meaning of Pentecost guiding our deliberations, the Susanna Stephen Board has selected two recipients for this year's Pentecost Love offering. The first, Lutheran Disaster Response, is assisting families from Ukraine and the second, Habitat for Humanity of Cape Cod, is assisting families right here on Cape Cod.

LUTHERAN DISASTER RESPONSE

For over forty years, Lutheran Disaster Response (elca.org/disaster) has been 'following Christ's call to bring hope and healing to our neighbors in need'. Today, it continues its outreach mission of responding to emergencies and disasters here in the US and around the world, all in the name of God's love for all people.

Ukraine families are fleeing their homes to seek shelter where ever they can. In addition to shelter, these refugees need food, water, clothing and medicine. These are immediate basic needs. The Ukraine people are our neighbors, living in a dire emergency situation.

HABITAT FOR HUMANITY CAPE COD

Habitat for Humanity of Cape Cod partners with families in need of an affordable home to build one of their own, "fostering stability, self-reliance and a strong sense of community." They are an ecumenical housing ministry St. Peter's has consistently supported which seeks to make decent, affordable shelter a matter of conscience and action. Habitat for Humanity of Cape Cod has developed over 150 affordable homes across all 15 towns on Cape Cod. They are currently building homes right here in Harwich.

We hope that you will join us in supporting these two worthwhile organizations whose missions are to bring a sense of safety and love to families both here and throughout the world.

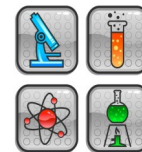

Factories of Recycled Rock

This column deals with our planet's land acreage to make room for everyone.

Active volcanoes offer the closest glimpse of the blazing forces that lie below the Earth's crust. Eighty percent of land was created by plumes of magma and pumice, the aftermath of volcanic activity everywhere above and below the sea. Recycled rock is what gave us one of America's favorite vacation places: the islands of Hawaii. It took hundreds of thousands of years before Hawaii rose to the level of sea-water and thereafter Mauna Kea became the oldest mountain at about 1 million years old. Hawaii is just the beginning of a chain of hotspots across the Pacific.

Vesuvius is an active volcano because it erupted in 79 A.D. and again in 1631. In Indonesia, Krakatoa erupted in 1883 doubling the size of its territory and causing a tsunami that killed 36,000 people. The Great Dying volcanoes that erupted 250,000 years ago under the Atlantic Ocean wiped out 96% of all primitive life on the earth! Volcanoes like Kilauea and Sicily's Stromboli are changing the face of the earth as I write.

Volcanic lava is highly viscous liquid that solidifies into igneous rock, the most common rock on earth. Our planet is made up of numerous tectonic rocky plates located beneath the earth's crust. They 'float' on the hot mantle of the earth's interior. When they collide, one plate can thrust upwards causing archipelagos or mountains of land such as the Galapagos, the Aleutian Islands, Japan and Hawaii. The Mid-Atlantic Ocean ridge is a mountain range 13,000 feet high and 40,000 miles long. It rises above sea level to form the volcanic island of Iceland. The world's tallest peaks are found among the 1500-mile-long Himalayan range between India and China. When magma beneath such territories erupts, lava can spill out increasing the area of land anywhere on Earth.

For the first time in over 90 years, in May 2018, fissures opened up from the base of Kilauea volcano on Hawaii's big island. Lava poured out from the east rift of the volcano and wind blew heat and gases southwesterly damaging vegetation to the south but sparing the land to the north. By the middle of August, lava flowing over the southeastern corner of the island destroyed over 700 homes and added 875 acres of new land! Our planet has lots of space to make additional land, because 75% of the world's surface is water.

God knew more land would be required with the world's increasing population! Hawaii is just the beginning of many hotspots across the Pacific.

A RESPONSE FROM PASTOR CHRISTIAN

Wow. Living on the Cape we are very aware of glacial deposits as well as modern day erosion. Some of us (i.e. me) are less mindful of ways in which new land masses can be formed through volcanic activity. I'm not so sure about volcanic activity as a solution to the world's increasing population! Though, in recently re-reading the Old Testament books narrating how God instructed the people to drive out or massacre Canaanites, Hittites, Hivites, Perizzites, Girgashites, Amorites, Jebusites, and take the land-- it seems like a major volcano might have made for a more peaceful solution.

Doug's science article does fill me with a sense of awe and creation and reminds me of one of our beloved scriptures, Psalm 46.

Psalm 46 gives expression to the wonder and fear instilled by earthquakes and tsunamis:

God is our refuge and strength, a very present help in trouble.

Therefore we will not fear, though the earth should change,
though the mountains shake in the heart of the sea;

though its waters roar and foam, though the mountaintops tremble with its tumult

"Be still and know that I am God! I am exalted among the nations, I am exalted in the earth."

The Lord of hosts is with us; the God of Jacob is our refuge.

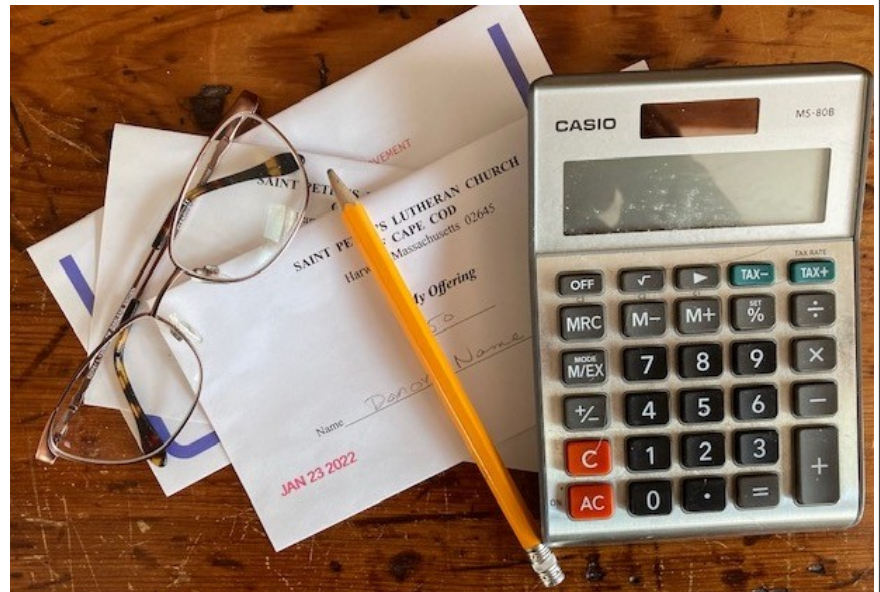
Approved \$1,300 for new fire alarms in the church and \$1,370 for new Robie contract concerning the boilers.

Financial Secretary: A First Hand View to Generosity

Did you ever wonder how your quarterly giving statement appears in your mail box? You can thank volunteers Paul Bongfeldt, St. Peter's Financial Secretary, and Assistant Financial Secretary, Lois Thomas, for the work behind the scenes that makes this happen. As described in the church's bylaws, the Financial Secretary is responsible for keeping accurate records of all income from contributing members of St. Peter's and



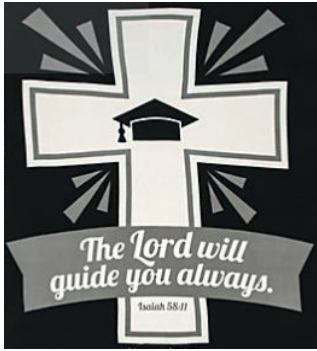
reporting back to individual givers in quarterly statements. According to Paul, however, recording and reporting only tells half the story of this important job. The real thrill says Paul is seeing first-hand how the generosity of members and friends supports the missions of St. Peter's. This is what makes his job as Financial Secretary so rewarding.

As a founding member, Paul's history with St. Peter's goes back to its early days but then his life journey took him to California and Rhode Island before he and his wife Juliet moved to Cape Cod permanently about 9 years ago. He was asked about 6 years ago by Pastor Tiffany to serve as Financial Secretary. Paul's work in the insurance industry, serving on Councils and in a financial capacity at several churches, trained him to review financial statements in preparation for the duties of Financial Secretary. But Paul says that if you can consistently balance your checkbook and have a general knowledge of accounting you can do the job. Maintaining the confidentiality of giving by individual donors is another important aspect of his work. Some familiarity with computer technology is also helpful as giving records are entered in the church management software program, OneChurch.

After several years serving as Financial Secretary Paul would like to step down now and see a new person take over this rewarding position. Do you have 1-1/2 hours of time weekly and another hour monthly to donate to St. Peter's? Do you enjoy working with other volunteers and being part of a team? What are you sad about in this time of COVID? I am sad about the opportunities I missed due to covid including studying abroad in Argentina and spending time on campus with friends.

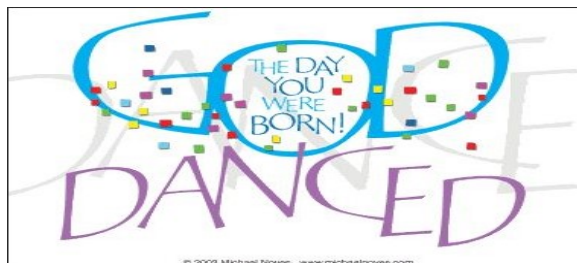
Plans for the future (summer and beyond):
