View From the Deck



As a young person I was fascinated by the Westward Movement of Caucasian settlers from the East in our country. I am the great-granddaughter of someone who was born during that movement. North Carolina to California, via Kansas and Colorado was the journey my ancestors made over several generations.

The idea of covered wagons, sod houses, leaving everything behind was romantic and mystifying. Why would any one do that?! Don't get me wrong; I'm glad they left the hollers of mountainous North Carolina to make their way to the land of citrus and salt air.



Usually women did not have a say in this. Because of economic circumstances,

fear, or crazy dreams, the men said, "Let's go" and the women began to pack. Belongings were carefully sorted, and sometimes had to be left alongside the road as loads needed to be lightened. Those mothers and aunts who stayed behind gathered flower seeds from their established gardens to share with those who were moving away, hoping that somewhere in the west the same flowers would bloom and remind the new landowner that someone back East loved her.

I've been thinking about this as a metaphor for our lives right now. We're on an epic journey, going someplace new that we have never seen and only can dream about. We did not necessarily choose this journey; most of us feel it was forced upon us. And here we are. No destination that we can yet see. No wheel ruts to show us the way. We have no idea how long this journey is going to last and we don't know when we'll arrive. We haven't been on this road before.

Do you feel lost along the way? A bit disoriented? Uncertain of what our future will look like? I'm with you!



As a pastor it is expected that I'll help lead us along this path. I have to say, it is difficult to lead when I'm in your same wagon. God has not given ordained people special visions of the path ahead; we don't hear angel guides giving us clues ("turn left at the next crisis point"). What we clergy do have is faith - faith that we are not on our own. Faith that God is on this road with us.

Faith that God will go with us into this uncertain future. Faith that God isn't done with the Church yet and that we still have a vibrant future ahead. And we know this because the Bible is full of stories when God led God's people into a totally new future (Sarai and Abram leaving Haran for Canaan; the Israelites fleeing out of Egypt and into the wilderness; Joshua entering the Promised Land; Jesus going to Golgotha; Peter, James and John leaving their nets for a new type of fishing.)

Where we are going is not going to look like what we left behind. We're never going back to the way it was back before COVID. Perhaps we'll plant a few flowers along the way, reminders that we had a past that mattered, even as we build a new future.

May God bless this journey, giving us safety and peace, in the midst of so many unknowns. May Christ walk these steps with us, showing us the way. And may the Spirit of God comfort and encourage and challenge us to stay faithful along the way.

12 noon and 7 pm Worship services will be offered in person, and one of the services will be livestreamed for those who wish to join at home.


<u>Wednesdays at 12 noon</u> we'll offer midweek Lenten services, followed by fellowship outside under the portico.

"from the Organ Bench"

Like everyone else, I am wondering, sometimes dreaming, about what "post-COVID" will look like for life in general, and especially in church. And, there is a bit of fear in that, as I also wonder what church music in general is going to look like, considering the changes we have made already in how we present our musical offerings during worship. I have a bit of professional insecurity about this.



I am reminded of the times when we organists used to have a pretty meaningful time playing funeral and memorial services on old Hammond organs in the funeral homes. Not only did such dates provide a little added income, we felt like we were really doing something for families who were in great need. And then somebody got the bright idea of using CD's, piped through their existing sound systems, along with speakers from the podium! You get where I'm going with this. I hate to be the bearer of very bad news, but some churches had been doing this already, long before COVID.

Fortunately I don't have to tell many people here at St. Peter's that there is no substitute for the giving and receiving of a live musical message, within the context of a live worship service. But we learned during COVID that sometimes this is not possible, and certainly not recommended. My only hope is that those times are behind us and that we can instead, when looking forward, find positive new ways to involve as many people as wish to participate, in new ways of bringing God's message to the people in the pews and online.

But, back to the plans of a post-COVID existence. I have spent some time recently perusing writings from all churches and denominations on the subject. Actually I have been doing this since the start of the pandemic. Recently I ran across an article called "12 trends for being church in a post-pandemic world" written by Barry Howard, a Baptist pastor. At the time the article was written, we were only 6 weeks into the pandemic, and already the alarm bells for churches folding, going bankrupt, losing their importance in every day lives, were going off. He brings a message of hope in his piece and does not dwell for one minute on the negative aspects of the pandemic, but instead looks forward in a hopeful way with each citation. One observation in particular jumped out at me: "There will be more emphasis on small-group gatherings and less emphasis on large-group gatherings." Pastor Howard goes on to say "The strength of a church will be manifest in small group connections, rather than crowd size. The post-COVID church will focus more on spiritual muscle than physical mass."

So here's my challenge for you: if you've ever wanted to sing, play an instrument, start a musical group outside of the two fine groups we already have (Sanctuary Choir and St. Peter's Handbell Choir) - talk to me about your idea! Fortunately, (and this is indeed very fortunate) St. Peter's already has a history of ensemble musicians gracing worship services during holiday times and summer. I would like to build on this, to include as many people who wish to be a part of the ministry of music as possible, and in new ways. Let me add the days of presenting larger choral works (either with bells or instruments) do not have to be a thing of the past. But understand, other churches and other church music programs in our area are experiencing the same challenges as we, and I believe there may exist a hunger for more collaboration of these smaller choirs among churches in the future.

Let's commit to looking forward in positive ways, to collaborate and most importantly, to dream. Let's be open: to new ideas, new musical literature, and new ways to present music in worship. And most importantly, do not hesitate to speak to me directly, or to ask questions!



Lunar Lunacy

When the full moon rises at sunset then sets at sunrise, it does not cross the sky from east to west. It only appears to move in that direction. It's the Earth's rotation from west to east that cast this illusion of the moon taking only half a day to cross the sky. Because the orbital velocity of the moon is much less than the rotational velocity of the Earth, the moon crosses the sky from west to east at an average velocity of a little less than 2,300 mph. Proof of



this matter is easy: note the moon's location at 9 PM. Then, one day later, note the new noon's little new location at 9 PM. You'll find it to be about 13° to the east of the old location! Don't forget, it takes over 27 days for the moon to orbit the Earth just once and only 24 hours for the Earth to make a full rotation.

The moon's orbit is an elliptical one varying from a maximum distance (apogee) of 252,000 miles to a minimum distance (perigee) of 225,000 miles. When the moon reaches its perigee, gravity causes the highest of tides. When the tide is high on one side of the Earth, it's also high on the opposite side to keep the Earth rotation balanced.

It's well known the moon keeps the same side always facing the Earth. Consequently we never see its backside. As it revolves the moon rotates slightly from the west to the east creating this phenomenon. Extra gravity caused by the Earth's rotation makes the moon rotate **JUST ENOUGH** to keep it aligned always facing the Earth.

The diameter of the moon is 2,160 miles, about 1/4 the size of the Earth. The moon has a steadying influence that keeps the Earth's axis tilted at 23.4°. These two bodies actually revolve around each other, but the moon does most of the revolving.

An accepted hypothesis of the moon's formation is as follows: About 4 billion years ago the molten Earth was hit by another planet X. The impact destroyed X hurling chunks of debris into space. The largest chunk solidified as Earth, and a smaller chunk began revolving around the Earth as it solidified into the moon. It's the most probable theory that astronomers have accepted, but it's still a hypothesis. Only God knows how it all came about as the Earth and moon were created by design!

PASTOR'S RESPONSE BY CHRISTIAN HOLLECK

Did you know?

Some Bible verses regard the moon as part of God's creation, which we can behold with wonder. For example, Psalm 8 speaks of looking at the moon and stars with wonder, reflecting the majesty and grandeur of God's creation. Psalm 136 speaks of the the sun that rules the day and the moon that rule the night; both are signs of God's loving kindness. Psalm 121:6 is somewhat different, affirming God's protection for those traveling: "The sun shall not strike you by day nor the moon by night." There was an ancient belief that the moon could pose danger; one could be 'moon-struck.' Matthew 4:24 speaks of Jesus healing epileptics; a literal translation of the Greek could also be "those struck by the moon." In summary, some verses reflect a biblical world view different from our own regarding the dangers of the moon. However, there are constant themes of God providing protection to his people as they travel by day or night, and an affirmation that all of creation glorifies God. "Praise him, sun and moon; Praise him, all you shining stars!"
