Annual Congregational Meeting Summary

St. Peter's 2023 congregational meeting was held following the service on Sunday, February 25. Ministry, committee, and financial reports were shared and accepted. The 2024 operating budget was presented and passed, with one adjustment to organ maintenance (\$1,000 less). The resolutions calling for acceptance of minutes of previous meetings, acceptance of committee and auxiliary reports, acceptance of financial secretary and treasurer reports were passed. (Resolutions 1-4).

The congregation passed Resolution #5 calling for an amendment to the Five-Year Capital Plan. The amendment was to approve an increase of \$45,000 to complete the Pipes for Praise Installation Project. During the discussion, Pastor Dennis announced that two anonymous donors had made commitments to contribute \$44,000 to address the increases. (More information on these donations can be found elsewhere in this newsletter.)

Resolution #6 was passed to adopt the revised Five-Year Capital budget.

The equity transfers proposed in Resolution #7 also passed. Peg Flood presented the nominating committee's recommendations regarding positions on the congregational council, the nominating committee, synod assembly delegates, and the Cape Cod Council of Churches Annual Assembly. Lynn Archambault volunteered to serve on the nominating committee to fill the one vacancy. All nominees for all positions were approved by the congregation. (Resolution #8)

The meeting adjourned after a closing prayer.

Pastoral Perceptions

What are some of your favorite Bible verses? Which words or phrases cross your mind unexpectedly? Which stories of the Scripture provide the impetus into expanding your awareness of the presence of God in your daily life? What passage do you lean upon when the hoary head of reality strips you bare?

The primary Lenten disciplines are reading scripture, fasting, acts of good works, and daily prayer. Various traditions, in and out of the Lutheran faith, have additional disciplines. The intent, regardless of one's practice, is the deliberate journey to deepen spiritual awareness, come closer to God, and to prepare for the celebration of Easter.

The questions raised in the opening paragraph can serve both as a catalyst and a means to measure one's journey. Did your responses come easily? Did the questions invite you to "pause" from a stream of thoughts and entice further reflection? Did the questions spur a remembrance of a person, experience, or a particular period of time?

In the 1970s, people saw only 500 to 1,600 ads per day. By 2017, the average American encountered 4,000 to 10,000 ads daily. Facebook Advertising alone reaches 2.11 billion people. But here's the twist: our brains filter out most of these stimuli to prevent information overload. We consciously notice only a fraction of the ads and other stimuli we encounter according to neuroscience and perception research. The research reveals that we filter out most ads or other stimuli, focusing on only a small fraction defined by what we desire and treasure.

May the disciplines of Lent, practiced throughout the year, combined with consistent worship, shape both your filter and responses to the questions above.

<u>To Pause at the Threshold: Reflections on Living on the Border</u>

A Lenten Easter Study Opportunity Led by the Rev. Stewart Pattison Sundays from March 3 to April 14 (not on Easter Sunday) OR

Wednesday Mornings from 10-11 am in the Luther Room

I will be leading a six-week Lenten-Easter study-reflection group on the theme of The "Thresholds." We will meet in the Luther Room after the service ends. I will draw on the reflections of the contemplative Esther de Waal in her book, To Pause at the Threshold: Reflections on Living on the Border. The border is that of England and Wales which she develops as a metaphor for the movements of the spiritual life. We cross many thresholds daily, often unaware that we are doing so. By becoming mindful of these crossing points, I hope to introduce spiritual practices which will deepen awareness of the love of God for us in even the most routine activities. The class will build toward Holy Week and the great threshold of Jesus' death and resurrection. By identifying our thresholds with those of Jesus, we will find that there is no moment of life that is untouched by the Cross and the Empty Tomb.

My approach is shaped by a three-year certificate course in Spiritual Formation and a two-year certificate course in Spiritual Direction, both from Columbia Theological Seminary (PCUSA). The second gift is to be used as a dollar-for-dollar match over a three year period. The Pipes for Praise committee will be sending an appeal letter outshortly. The donor announced the initial dollar-for-dollar match will be for donations received (up to \$15,000) during the months of March and April 2024.

Extinction of the Species

Can you imagine God is trying to tell us something? Charles Darwin told us about the "Evolution of the Species," and now we're learning about the extinction of many living organisms. The International Union for Conservation of Nature (IUCN) has stated: "Over a quarter of all species have survivals that are threatened." Thanks to efforts by the IUCN, five species are beginning to bounce back. They are the Northern Bald Ibis (below), Round Island Gecko, Amsterdam Albatross, Cross River Gorilla, and the White-Naped Crane, but the good news does not balance the bad news which is that one million species are threatened with extinction within decades.

Scientists are taking extraordinary measure to save birds, fish, reptiles, amphibians, and other organisms such as plants. Since 1750, over 50 species of plants have gone extinct with unknown consequences except for the lack of oxygen they would release. Do the people who cut our rain forests not realize they're cutting the amount of oxygen they can inhale? Fortunately there are 50,000 species of plants on our planet, but reforestation is a very important factor when considering the green foundation of our ecosystem. On the Hawaiian island of Kauai, there's a plant called Melanthera waimeaensis with very narrow leaves. Only seven of them remain as they were crowding out Hawaii's native species.

For decades scientists hypothesized it was an asteroid crashing into the Gulf of Mexico that wiped out the dinosaurs. It now appears it wasn't just the asteroid but instead a natural extinction. Keep in mind, turtles were not wiped out when the dinosaurs

vanished.

What worries me is the eventual extinctions of all organisms such as man. The IUCN's methods of conservation are not to be ignored. I wish Charles Darwin was alive today to predict the demise or preservation of living organisms.

For fellowship with God, we must save our species!

Pastoral Response: The Genesis story indicates the inhabitants of the created world were one. The symbiotic relationship was broken by humanity's fall. Thus, for diverse reasons, whether it be by cosmic events or human actions, all earth's inhabitants have suffered. Sadly, whether it be our relationship with the earth or each other, the suffering will continue until we "repent" of our attitude that we, and not God, are the center of the known world.

Dear Friends,

It's raining hard. The wind is really blowing. Yuba City, where we are living, and where the church is that Tiffany is pastor of, just lost power. It almost feels like Cape Cod! You have often been in our thoughts. On the one hand, I cannot believe it's already been four months since we left. There have been a hundred times I've wanted to share a hundred thank you's. Thank you for the goodbye celebrations. Thank you for your help after I fractured my foot. Thank you for helping us pack and clean and dispose of things. We couldn't have done it without you. Thank you for your prayers. Thank you for teaching me about what it means to be church, and to be community.

And now to finish that earlier thought: On the other hand, I can't believe it's only been four months. So much has happened! Regarding church, Tiffany and St. Andrew Presbyterian have hit the ground running. There's a lot of energy and a lot of ministry happening. As for me, twenty hours a week and two Sundays a month I serve as interim pastor at Red Bluff Presbyterian Church, an hour and a half north of Yuba City. Yes, everything is far apart in Northern California. There is lots of agricultural land. In fact, some members of the church who run a walnut and prune farm have a small guest house, which is where I sometimes stay overnight. I do regular pulpit supply for one Lutheran church east of Sacramento, and one Sunday a month for another Lutheran Church east of Yuba City. So, I feel like an old-time itinerant preacher, and I am getting to see much of California's northern landscape. We have a new bishop, and I am also active in the call process. When not doing something for a church, I'm playing with an orchestra, found a group to play pickle ball with, or am hiking somewhere with Molly and Tiffany!

Much of what I have to share with people in the churches I'm serving is due to my shared experiences with you, for which I feel much gratitude.

I wish and pray for your continued well-being, both individually and as a congregation, during this interim time which sounds like it is going very well. Thanks be to God!
