# The Wonders of Plants

Plants are essential to the survival of all living organisms as they exhale oxygen and inhale carbon dioxide so they can flourish. The world's 50,000 species are woody plants with a finite formed crown of foliage. The stem of a plant includes the inner fibrous heart and an outer covering of sap and bark.

Quaking Aspens are the most wide spread of all trees in North America. Mature bamboo grass is the tallest plant in the world at 100 feet. The largest flower in the plant kingdom is the Raffles Arnoldi from southern Sumatra, Indonesia. Sixty-eight percent of all plants and ferns grow in the tropics, 30 degrees north and south of the equator.

Leaves are loaded with a green pigment called chlorophyll that dominates their color during warm months and when the air becomes cool and dry, the chlorophyll breaks down to several carotenoids that promote the colors of autumn foliage.

A plant that bears leaves is called an Angiosperm, and a plant that bears needles is called a Gymosperm. When plants draw water (one inch per second) up from their roots, water mixes with inhaled carbon dioxide causing a chemical reaction that produces a glucose-like plant food. Balsa at only eight pounds per cubic foot is an angiosperm because it bears leaves, and an example of a gymnosperm is a yellow pine at fifty pounds per cubic foot.

#### A Book Review of Tim Alberta's <u>The Kingdom, the Power, and The Glory</u> by MJ Pattison


For anyone who is interested in reading further about the impact of nationalism on the Christian church, I recommend Tim Alberta's <u>The Kingdom the Power and the</u> <u>Glory: American Evangelicals in an Age of Extremism</u> (First Edition, 2023).

Once started, this book is impossible to put down. Alberta is a wonderful, compelling writer who does not shy away from telling hard truths about his own faith community. He has managed to get extensive interviews with most of leaders of the Evangelical movement over the past three decades. You will recognize many names and come away with a much better understanding that the fusing of Christianity and nationalist fervor is not a sudden phenomenon but has been developing over decades.

The author is an award-winning journalist and a staff writer for *The Atlantic*, but he is also a faithful Christian and the son of a pastor of a large mid-western Evangelical Christian church. He is exactly the right person to write this book. While much of Alberta's reporting is frightening and disturbing, he also includes many interviews with and stories about truly inspiring pastors, church members and college professors, who are standing up for an authentic Evangelical faith with great courage, often at a devastating personal cost.

Ultimately, I found this to be a hopeful book. Evangelical Christianity is not a monolith, and it is important for those of us who come from mainline or progressive protestant faith communities to find common cause with fellow Christians whose churches are being torn as under by this political polarization. This story is also Tim Alberta's story, which begins in his home church where he has returned to attend his

father's funeral and he is blind-sided by the division and animosity he finds there. The book also ends in his home church four years later, as he listens to a brave and compelling sermon from his father's successor. As a way forward, Alberta offers with these words from St. Paul's letter to the Corinthians "So we fix our eyes on not on what is seen, but on what is unseen, since what is seen is temporary, but what is unseen is eternal." (2 *Corinthians* 4:18)
