The Reopening Task Force has determined that the current protocols will remain unchanged at this time.



Thank you to all who held down the fort, continued the work of the church, and led worship in their absence.



Welcome New Staff Maggie Ribb Minister of Music



It was the most perfect spring day as I sat between my mother and father on those weird folding chairs that always made a squishy sound when you sat down. We were "in church" - a hall really, as the new addition including a big new sanctuary in view right outside the window was nearing completion. The organist had just finished the prelude and was about to start the opening hymn in the manner he always did: modulating to the new key, laying up organ stops, culminating with the opening introduction to the hymn. He did this every Sunday, and it never got old. But on this particular Sunday it was different for me, and I could not have felt more of a call to the work than if someone had tapped me on the shoulder. I remember the sunshine streaming in and the music swirling all around. I was 11-- ineffably hooked on church music and making no secret of my desire to play and learn at every opportunity. This church was new to us. We joined as part of a merger from an old Methodist Episcopal church in the next

city, where I had spent Sundays listening to choral warm-ups and pipe organ music; singing hymns, (chanting) psalms and spiritual songs, as the scripture goes. But with this new church would come all sorts of possibilities. Every two years we benefited from the leadership of different Masters' candidates from Union Theological Seminary, and I personally benefited from lessons in piano, keyboard harmony and conducting: opportunities to accompany congregations and have my own junior choir. College years brought studies in composition and organ, with summers in between working as a supply organist with pick-up choirs.

Having moved to the Cape from Fairfield, CT and Madison, NJ (Drew University) in the 70's, I eventually decided on foregoing the commute to New York to study composition, and instead focus on church work exclusively - that, and marrying my collaborator in music, Ron, starting a clam rake business with him and buying a house here in East Harwich. Our children, Greta and Kersti, came into the world shortly thereafter, accompanying their mom to any number of church services in infant seats and backpacks. Twelve churches and twenty-one clergy later (including the new St. Peter's mission in the old South Harwich meetinghouse years ago), I feel like I've come full circle.


I am so very delighted to be called to this church: a church made up of dedicated and faithful parishioners inspired in word and deed by their clergy, going about their work with tremendous energy and joy! I could see this immediately in conversations with the music search team; everyone was so welcoming and easy to talk to. They dedicated so much effort to the process, each bringing their own time and talents to the table. Such committees are often a microcosm of the entire parish, and I look forward to church life at St. Peter's because my "home church" is always the one I am serving at the time.

I am blessed to have my children close by: Greta in Chathamport, and Kersti in Harwich. They are both welders in the rake business and have been by my side through all the twists and turns life has brought us. Greta spends more time these days in their floral business, and welding is a second career for Kersti after having studied and worked as an APRN in Psychiatry at Yale - New Haven Hospital. And then there's little Oscar, our dachshund rescue and major part of our family. Hmmm...my favorite sweet treat? There are so many, but certainly Spritz comes to mind. There must be someone in this church who makes those! One of my favorite church songs is "Be Unto Your Name" by Lynn Deshazo, and one of my favorite Bible verses is Hebrews 11:1 - "Now faith is confidence in what we hope for and assurance about what we do not see." My question for God someday? With all you had to choose from, why did you choose me? I think I already know the answer. God calls each one of us in differing ways. We just have to be listening and respond.

It has been a pleasure talking with Joanie, Kathy and Rebecca as I try to navigate preparations while the Pastors are on sabbatical. Truly, I am grateful for all of their help in this time of transition. Additionally I think I speak for everyone when I say we appreciate all of the work of the many gifted supply musicians who have done an outstanding job of providing meaningful music for worship in the past months.

Looking forward to this next chapter with the people of St. Peter's...





Current Fuel Cell Vehicles

For decades, fuel cell vehicles have been only a dream, because they're so environmentally friendly as they emit only water. It's about time we eliminate the use of fossil fuels. The fuel of the future is pressurized hydrogen contained in carbonfiber tanks. Currently there are 2 dozen hydrogen filling stations in southern California as this is where the new hydrogen powered Toyota Mirai, Honda Clarity and Hyundai Nexo cars are being driven. Japan and Germany have more filling stations than any other country. In the northeast, a corridor of filling stations will be built on I-90 between Buffalo and Boston.

Fuel cells are made up of three parts: an anode, a cathode and a polymer membrane. Pressurized hydrogen atoms are split into protons (H+) and electrons (H-). It's a platinum catalyst in the anode that splits the hydrogen. The polymer membrane permits the H+ to pass through the cathode, but the H- electrons are routed to a circuit of electricity that powers the motor. Finally the H+ protons rejoin the H- electrons plus atmospheric oxygen to create water as exhaust! Only a little over 1 volt of electricity is produced by one fuel cell, but multiple cells in a stack is sufficient to drive a vehicle. The bigger the stack the more power there is.

The Toyota Mirai zips from 0 to 60 mph in only 9 seconds with a range of 310 miles. With windows closed, the only sound is the subtle whine of air passing under the grill which is needed to make an exhaust of water moisture. Five kilograms of pressurized hydrogen sits under the back seat and a stack of fuel cells sit under the driver's seat. A nickel-hydride battery stores excess electricity when it's not used.



Several companies have conducted hydrogen fuel cell research and practical fuel cell bus trials. These include: Daimler AG, Ballard Power Systems, Wrightbus, Van Hool, Thor Industries, Irisbus, TATA Motors and Indian Oil Corporation.


Hope for the Holidays

Holidays are an especially difficult time for individuals and families temporarily living in detention centers. These immigrants, waiting for their cases to be adjudicated, are separated from family, places of worship, and normal holiday celebrations. To provide a moment of caring and hope, Lutheran Immigration and Refugee Services launched the annual Hope for the Holidays program.

Last year, volunteers working with LIRS distributed over 30,000 cards and provided more than 500 children's gifts to migrant families in detention centers across the country, as well as to individuals and families who were recently released from detention. Notably, the campaign enabled every single migrant child in family detention centers in the country to open a special present over the holiday season.

We at St Peter's contributed cards donated and signed by members and sent to the LIRS office in Baltimore for distribution. This year the JustPeace team will again collect and send cards. We invite you to bring unsigned cards in to St Peter's beginning now. There will be a box in the narthex to collect them and tables set up for signing along with sample messages in English and Spanish. Because the cards must be received in Baltimore by 3 December we will be collecting them only until 21 November.

My Russian and French father, a naturalized US citizen, worked his way up to a position of Head of the Banquet Department at the Waldorf Astoria Hotel in New York City. Our family home was in rural upstate New York but my Father had a studio apartment in MYC so he did not have a daily commute.

I was a "Daddy's Girl" and from age 12 I would take the bus every few weeks down to the Port Authority Terminal where my Daddy would meet me and take me to all the top restaurants in Manhatten as a treat. We ste at Louis Quatorze (French)-Mamma Leone's (Italian)-Nathans, Mid-Town Steak-House and of course, the Waldorf,

On one of these delightful trips,my Daddy announced we were going to do something different. We took the subway to the Lower EastSide and got off at Second Ave.—it was scarey—it was called the Bowery and the streets were full of poor homeless souls—some sleeping on the streets with old blankets anjd lots of empty beer bottles shrewn around. We walked two blocks and then my

Father announced "this is it". IT was a three story tenement house-called a cold water flat-a drab old run down house-nothing like the nice house our family lived in inour friendly little village. The my Father identified this this tenement as the place he and my grandmother lived in when they first came to America from Paris. And then, I followed my Father through a very narrow dirty alley between two tenements into a courtyard with criss-crossed clothes lines filling all—the empty space-and I asked-"what is this?" and my Father's reply has been imprinted—in my memory ever since this day.

These are clotheslines and your grandmother did other peoples laundry so we could eat and live here when we first came to America AND no matter how well you do in life-never ever forget where your family started and be Grateful!!

And that is why I pledged money to the Safe Harbors Program and I am grateful for OUR LORD'S blessings to me and my family.






