This fall we had several days out on the *Pursuit*, Pastor Christian's dad's sailboat. It is always fun, and always a lot of work. First you have to pack the lunch and snacks, and then more snacks, because people always seem to be more hungry than normal on the water. Then you pack the dinghy, and the oars bag, and the foot pump box, and the dinghy engine and the one or two gas cans for the dinghy engine, and the life vests. And then you pack the things you'll need for the day: sunscreen, hat, bathing suit, towel, change of clothes (always a good idea, even on a large sailboat.)

And then you leave to drive to the harbor. (I did say this was fun, and a lot of work, didn't I?)

Twice this fall we went out on *Pursuit* with friends. One day had young adults who had the energy and interest to put up both sails and go for it. If only the wind had cooperated. (There was hardly any.) The crew still had fun along the way, and they ate almost all of the food that was packed.

The second trip was only a few days later, with a crew made up of several of the church staff and some of their family. These folks were not new to the water and not new to Cape Cod. As we sailed across Buzzards Bay, they regaled us with stories of places along the shore we've only seen from a distance. They told us tales of when they were young, sailing these waters. (And I thought WE were adventurous! Yipes!) On this trip we had a lot of wind and we flew along the water. And the crew (mostly) had fun along the way and had a lot of food left when we arrived back in the harbor.

There's an ancient symbol for the church - that of a boat with a cross for a mast. There's a lot in that image to consider. Jesus is our captain. The Spirit is the wind that is blowing us along. We're the crew, ready to work together and put all hands on deck to get us to where we are going.

UPDATES FROM URUGUAY

Joanna's October Newsletter

A QUICK REFRESHER: I am serving as volunteer with the Young Adults in Global Mission (YAGM) program, a program of the ELCA. I'm working alongside the community El Sembrador (The Sower) and the Lutheran congregation of Nuestro Salvador (Our Savior) in Montevideo. As a YAGM, my mission is centered around the idea of accompaniment, which emphasizes the fact that we don't need to bring God to the communities we're walking alongside because God is already there.

As I sit here writing this newsletter, it's been exactly one month since I arrived at my site placement in Montevideo. I'm still trying to settle into a daily routine and a "new normal," but I already feel grateful for the connections that I've made in my communities here. In the past month, I've reflected a lot on my personal role in these communities, and I'd like to focus this newsletter on these reflections as well.

One of the communities I am part of is the group of students that I am living with. Universities in Uruguay do not have student housing, so many churches in Montevideo also operate student homes. Nuestro Salvador, where I live and attend services, is home to 12 students in addition to myself. We share a communal kitchen, bathrooms, and laundry room, and we also have access to a patio behind the church. I've enjoyed the conversations I've had with other students in the kitchen while cooking ourselves dinner and have appreciated their recommendations for local markets, restaurants and site seeing attractions. The students don't have a lot of time to hang out outside of the "house", but I am grateful that there are other young people where I am living that I can talk to and share a community space with.

In addition to renting out student housing, Nuestro Salvador also extends their ministry into the community in other ways. Church services continue to remain small, but it's clear that the church reaches the needs of the city in multiple ways. They focus especially on health, offering support for individuals with HIV, yoga and tai chi classes for overall well-being, alcoholics and narcotics

anonymous groups that meet daily, and a dentist office that is located in the church building. They also serve hot meals to the homeless in the winter. One of the ways I've appreciated getting involved in the church has been by playing flute in church services, either as a prelude/offertory or as accompaniment on hymns, which are otherwise sung a cappella.

I have also enjoyed getting to know people in the community of El Sembrador, where I am volunteering. El Sembrador is a community space that was created 8 years ago for children in a low-income neighborhood who didn't have any other access to recreational activities. Some of the children from El Sembrador are now teenagers who are using the skills they learned from El Sembrador's workshops to be leaders for their peers. This group of youth leaders (ages 12-17) is called Meraki, a Greek word that means "to put your heart into something." After noticing that there was a lof of bullying in their schools, the youth of Meraki began a campaign against bullying, visiting schools in their area to teach their peers about bullying prevention. Meraki is the first group of youth to be doing this work peer-to-peer, and this year they are expanding by visiting schools throughout the entire state of Canelones.

UPDATES FROM URUGUAY Joanna's October Newsletter

As a volunteer, I spend a significant amount of time accompanying Meraki on their visits to various schools, offering anti-bullying workshops. I continue to be impressed by the leadership demonstrated by the Meraki youth, but one of the things I have struggled with is figuring out what skills I can offer that are valuable during these workshops. Although I am comfortable conversing in Spanish one-on-one, I am still unable to speak to a classroom full of students in Spanish, and I don't have the same insider perspectives that the Meraki youth can offer their peers.

While grappling with these questions, I also reflected on one of the messages that I heard over and over at my pre-departure orientation: sometimes the best thing we can do is just be. As US Americans, we are part of a culture that emphasizes productivity, success and the need to constantly be doing something with a tangible outcome. In contrast, many YAGM alumni shared the value of being and the fact that the most valuable moments we have are often those where we are just able to sit and listen. In other words, we should learn to be a bit less like Martha and a bit more like Mary, who could recognize the importance of doing nothing "productive," but instead listening and learning (Luke 10: 38-42).

Being okay with the idea that I don't need to do anything is a hard thing to come to terms with, and I hope that as time goes on, I will be able to find a comfortable balance between doing and being. However, I have had a few meaningful moments in the past month where I was able to recognize the value of being: being present and being in community with each other. I end this newsletter with stories of two of these instances which I hold close to my heart.

The first school I visited with Meraki was an elementary school near El Sembrador. It was the last day of a month of anti-bullying workshops, and we visited four classrooms, asking the children what they learned and how they could continue the "revolution against bullying" on their own in the future. When the third grade class learned I was from the United States, they immediately ran to me, asking questions like "How do you say house in English? How do you say necklace? How do you say green?" When it was time for me to leave, they gave me a group hug and asked me if I could return to their school. I hope they realized that I appreciated their excited energy and warm welcome far more than they could have appreciated the simple English vocabulary I taught them.

One of the excursions I accompanied Meraki on was a trip to the center of Montevideo for the annual Marcha de la diversidad, a celebration of pride in support of the LGBTQ+ community. The pride march in Montevideo is a huge celebration, and I was grateful for the opportunity to participate in an event that is so important to the people of Montevideo. I was also grateful to the adult chaperones of Meraki for the chance to show the youth in the group that they are supported regardless of their gender or sexual orientation. The march was the first pride parade I had attended, and it was uplifting to be surrounded by so many people who were celebrating the same cause and to be literally swept up in the crowd with my new community.

formation with the church staff.


St. Peter's Ministries

Council Corner notes

Highlights of October 2022

- Accepted with regret the resignation letter from Minister of Music Maggie Ribb. She sent letter outlining her reasons for resignation.
- Both Pastors gave their monthly updates. Very clear we need additional volunteers for greeters, Liturgy leaders, altar care, and AV equipment leaders.
- f arphi Pastor Christian gave brief report on Calumet trip and he has reserved a retreat spot for next Fall.
- Russ gave a financial report which is disconcerting as Finance Committee is projecting presently a large deficit for 2023. Jim Merriam is also resigning from the Finance committee which he has served on for over 10 years. Gratitude was expressed for Jim's leadership.
- Discussed with the affirmative vote for the organ there will be a large first organization meeting to come up with some major working ideas and hopefully firm up what task forces need to be set up and ways to move forward with the initial planning.
- Peg Flood presented her thank you note to St. Paul's in East Longmeadow for the pipe organ. The Olsons and Archambaults will attend their celebration service on 10/30. They will present the letter. We also voted to donate \$250 in their name to the Association of Lutheran Church Musicians for a scholarship. This will come from the Memorial Fund.
- Looked briefly at the new building use guidelines. We have been approached by the Cape Cod Academy to rent some of our downstairs space. Russ will send out the draft for Council to review.
- Approved to pay \$150 for Juliet Bongfeldt's registration to attend a white privilege seminar. Juliet is the chair of the JustPeace Team which has explored issues of race and equity.



FROM THE ST. PETER'S TECH TEAM

Greetings from the St. Peter's tech team. We met on September 4th and scheduled ourselves to stream the Sunday service through the end of the year. We look forward to continuing to stream the Sunday services live.

As we see the service through the camera's eye, we have two suggestions that might help us remember and include our members and friends participating in the service remotely.

First, when the camera pulls back to show the whole church the focus is on the center aisle and pews 1 through 6 (working backwards from the front.). If there are empty seats on the center aisle in these pews, please sit there. Sometimes the church will be full of people along the sides and in the back, but these pews are empty so participants at home can 't see the gathered congregation.

The second suggestion we have is that during the passing of the peace, consider standing in the aisle between pews 5 and 6 and look at the black camera on the upper left hand side of the sanctuary as you face the back of the church. Offer a wave or a sign of peace to anyone watching the service.

It is wonderful to be back together for worship and for the most part (fingers crossed) we have worked out the "kinks" in our streaming process. If anyone is interested in joining the tech team please let Pastor Tiffany, or one of us know.

It is not difficult and it's a lot of fun.

Extinction of the Species

Charles Darwin told us about the evolution of the species and now we're learning about the extinction of many living organisms. The International Union for Conservation of Nature have stated "Over a quarter of all species" have survivals that are threatened." They are the Northern Bald Ibis, Round Island Gecko, Amsterdam Albatross, Cross River Gorilla and the White-Naped Crane, but the good news does not balance the bad news which is: One million species are threatened with extinction within decades. A Jurassic ichthyosaur pictured above, is on display at the Royal Ontario Museum. Nevada was submerged under an ocean millions years ago, and a marine reptile called ICHTHYOSAUR flourished there. This predator, bigger than a whale, had 6-inch teeth that ripped into its prey. It became extinct 90 million years ago. The fossil was excavated in the Augusta mountains of Nevada in 2008.

Scientists are taking extraordinary measures to save birds, fish, reptiles, amphibians and other organisms such as plants! Since 1750, 500 species of plants have gone extinct with unknown consequences except for the lack of oxygen they would release. Do the fools who cut our rainforests not realize they're cutting the amount of oxygen that humans can inhale? Fortunately, there are 50,000 species of plants on our planet, but reforestation is a very important factor when considering the green foundation of our ecosystem. On the Hawaiian island of Kauai is a plant called Melanthera with very low narrow leaves. Only seven of them remain because they were crowding out Hawaii's native species.

For decades scientists hypothesized it was an asteroid crashing into the Gulf of Mexico that wiped out the dinosaurs. It is now known it wasn't just the asteroid but instead a natural extinction. 10,000 years from now the sun will be hotter causing many plants to become extinct. This is now a proven fact, most life on earth will become extinct by the lack of oxygen in a billion years. We do not need to think about a billion years from now but we do need to think about what will happen to our planet in the next 10,000 years. When plants begin to dry up, no longer will photosynthesis be able to supply us with the amount of oxygen we have and need today.


What worries me is the eventual extinctions of all organisms such as man! The IUCN's method of conservation is not to be ignored. I wish Charles Darwin was alive today to predict the demise or preservation of living organisms. Will God reveal a substitute for oxygen? Many efforts are being made to maximize the amount of oxygen so that we can save some species but not all of them. Will all species be recycled and born again in our cosmos? I hope so.

And finally the last verses of the last Psalm:

A Faithful Yes on Question 4

You shall love the alien as yourself

Faith matters when it comes to our votes. On November 8 we have a fresh opportunity to vote our values on a vital question, Ballot Question Number 4. This question stems from an effort to repeal The Work and Family Mobility Act, better known as the Drivers License Bill. The bill provides undocumented immigrants with an opportunity to receive drivers' licenses. The ballot question is an effort to repeal it.

In June of this year, the Massachusetts legislature passed this important bill with enough strength to override the governor's veto. It received strong endorsement from a majority of sheriffs and DA's in the state and the Massachusetts Major Cities Chiefs of Police, along with immigrant advocacy groups. The benefits of this action, which would take effect on July 1, 2023, are clear:

Roads will be safer, with all drivers receiving proper training and licensing (with proof of identity), and having insurance. Immigrant neighbors will be able to drive to work, school, medical appointments, etc. without anxiety.

The opponents of this action argue according to familiar misconceptions and fears. That is, that immigrants are responsible for drugs and crime, that they are a drain on state resources, that they are "undeserving." The truth is, immigrants commit less crime than their neighbors, work in many essential jobs, pay taxes, and are a boon to the economy.

Another argument is that obtaining a drivers license will result in allowing non-citizens to vote. Secretary of State Galvin has said this claim is "baseless...we can solve any concern there is about this." (masslive.com, 5-27-22)

Scripture speaks clearly to us: "The alien who resides with you shall be to you as the citizen among you; you shall love the alien as yourself..." (Leviticus 19:34). "Contribute to the needs of the saints; extend hospitality to strangers." (Romans 12:13).

The Quran declares that all who need it should be able to find refuge on God's earth, and tells how, when Mohammed and his followers migrated from Mecca to Medina, local residents shared their resources with them. (Quran 59:9)

The call to people of faith to serve others is unmistakable. A vote for Yes on Question 4 will preserve a good law that helps accomplish this.

The Nauset Interfaith Association Board of Directors encourages you to vote Yes on 4 -

for safer roads, stronger economy, and most of all, to bear witness to the love of God for our immigrant neighbors.
