
Pastoral Care


Several pastors are on call to provide for pastoral care needs—a hospital or home visit, a prayer via telephone, and, if necessary, a funeral service.







Memorial Garden

ATTENTION: All Current owners of Columbarium niches or Scattering Garden space

The committee met in August to go over the process of the application/contract and specifications for interment in the Memorial Garden. We found that we needed to connect with all of you via this notice. We will also follow up with a letter and attachments outlining and reinforcing the process.

Key points you need to take note of are the following:

- Keep your application/contract and specifications in a safe place with your important papers, so they can be found easily, i.e., with your will.
- If you have misplaced this information, you may contact either myself or Operations Admin, Kathy Branton to obtain a copy.
- The cremation certificate of the deceased is required at the time of interment (or within a reasonable timeframe). May be given or sent to the pastor, church office or chair to be kept on record at the church. This is a requirement by law and you must comply. This document is either obtained with the delivery of the ashes, or can be requested from the funeral home or crematory.
- Suggest that the engraving be done prior to opening/closing of the niche for interment so as not to incur additional cost. (Applies to columbarium only.)

Help Needed ASAP!

For many years the Esther Circle has sent Christmas boxes to the New England Seafarers' Mission in Boston. This wonderful mission provides help, hospitality and comfort to the many ships, both cruise and industrial, that come into Boston harbor (over 550 in 2020!). We have seen pictures of seafarers joyously holding the gifts we've sent of hats, socks, personal items and sweet treats.



During a visit to St. Peter's Pastor Stephen Cushing, Senior Chaplain, described the hard, dangerous lives the crew members live. These hardships have been compounded by the advent of COVID 19. Seafarers were already at sea for many months at a time and now ships were floating offshore, unable to dock with the crew trapped onboard. The ministry then had to happen on the gangways of ships as no one from the mission was allowed on deck.

While we believe this ministry to be very worthwhile and hope to continue our practice of sending gift boxes, there is a need for help to do this. Evie Sherwonit has coordinated the gathering of items and the shoeboxes to fill, but is retiring now and will no longer be in charge of this project. In addition, Irv Freimuth has helped to obtain funds from Thrivent and pack the wrapped gifts into larger boxes and taken them to another church which then transports them to Boston. Therefore we are in need of one or two (or more) people to take over this rewarding endeavor. The Esther Circle ladies are willing to help where we can and provide additional funds for the gift items, but are no longer able to lead. Evie will be happy to pass on her knowledge and Irv is happy to help with advice on the Thrivent paperwork. And we can certainly help with filling and wrapping the boxes in early December.



The Wonders of Laser Technology

October 2021

A laser is a device that emits amplified optical light based on the stimulated emission of electromagnetic radiation (Light Amplified by Stimulated Emission of Radiation). A laser beam emits a coherent light that can be focused on a tiny spot with a very narrow spectrum. The scanning of printed barcodes on grocery items is a well-known use of laser technology. Did you know it's lasers that read compact discs and DVDs? They also cut, weld and print on metals, glass and paper. Lasers perform as aids to law enforcement and medical surgery. Blue lasers can be used for headlamps on luxury cars to produce highly directional white lights, and red laser-pointers are a great tool for teachers in the classroom!



The wave links of lasers vary between 200 and 4,000 nanometers on the spectrum. One nanometer is onebillionth of a meter. There are infrared, ultraviolet, X-ray and gamma ray lasers where light bounces back-andforth between a pair of mirrors being

amplified on each bounce. It's the electrons around atomic nuclei that become dislodged or excited that causes the emission of electromagnetic radiation from either a gas, liquid, solid or plasma. Examples of lasers are ruby, sapphire, heliumneon, helium-silver, argon ion, neon-copper, hydrogen-fluoride, nitrogen fluorine and carbon dioxide. Lasers pass through optical fibers over long distances as a key to technology in modern communications such as the Internet!

Modern telescopes use lasers to compensate for the blurring effect of our atmosphere. High energy laser weapons, such as the US Air Force's airborne laser on a Boeing 747, have been used to shoot down rockets and artillery shells. Laser technology, then, is good for our nation whether it's used for useful functions or for our defense.

Laser technology is just another example of God bestowing intuition to humankind!

PASTOR'S RESPONSE BY CHRISTIAN HOLLECK

In his science articles Doug continuously invites us to engage the world through science, technology and human innovation. Doug frequently elaborates on what technology allows us to do? I wonder, beyond the science, how do new technologies help build human community? Can you see ways technology helps us to love God? Can you see ways technology helps us love our neighbors? How different are our lives from those of our parents or grandparents on account of technology? How different (or similar) is our love of God and neighbor?

- Financial reports show expenses are in line with the budget through August.
- The Re-opening Task Force is maintaining current rules for masking and distancing within the building.
- The exterior painting contract to Stewart Painting for \$16,944 will be paid in three installments.
- We are looking for a Sunday School teacher to replace Karen Beggs who is stepping down. Thank you, Karen, for your service.
- A drive-by recognition event for veterans is planned for November 11.
- The Esther Circle and PSALM groups are meeting regularly. A new coordinator for the Seafarers' Mission donations is being sought.
- -JustPeace is looking for new members.
- A donuts, coffee and cider outdoor social is planned for October 10 after worship service (Rain date October 17).
- Safe Harbors ministry is going very well with representatives of about 6 congregations involved.


