Something New Awaits Us: Liminal Space

MJ Pattison guided us into transitioning into our new journey in our life together as we prepare for the arrival of our Interim Pastor early in October. On September 26, Father Richard Rohr spoke to this further with a meditation on "Liminal Space," and thus I enclose some excerpts from his reflections. Father Rohr describes how both life and religion can invite us into liminal sacred space.

"We keep praying that our illusions will fall away. God erodes them from many sides, hoping they will fall. But we often remain trapped in what we call normalcy—"the way things are." Life then revolves around problem-solving, fixing, explaining, and taking sides with winners and losers. It can be a pretty circular and even nonsensical existence.

To get out of this repetitive cycle, we have to allow ourselves to be drawn into sacred space, into liminality. All transformation takes place here. There alone is our old world left behind, though we're not yet sure of the new existence. That's a good space where genuine newness can begin. We must get there often and stay as long as we can by whatever means possible. It's the realm where God can best get at us because our false certitudes are finally out of the way. This is the sacred space where the old world is able to fall apart, and a bigger world is revealed. If we don't encounter liminal space in our lives, we start idealizing normalcy. The threshold is God's waiting room. Here we are taught openness and patience as we come to expect an appointment with the Divine Doctor." (Richard Rohr's Daily Meditation from the Center for Action and Contemplation).

Our old world has been left behind as we are in a time of transformation. May God be with us and guide our conversations as we enter into this sacred space where change can take place and our new world revealed in "God's waiting room."

Our congregation has changed a lot as we have experienced three years of Covid, and we will be changing more as the year ahead unfolds.

We were ahead of the July 2023 year-to-date budget with a balance of \$16,596.04.

Financial Status August 31, 2023

The profit and loss Financial Statement for August has not been submitted to council; however, our year-to-date balance continued to increase. We have 95 Estimates of Giving for 2023 for a total of \$281,251 towards a goal of \$280,000. Pledged amounts through August should be \$187,500.66 vs. the amount received of \$202,531.28 which puts us ahead by \$15,030.62. Non-pledge amounts though August are estimated at \$23,333.33, and we have received \$16,805.00. We are behind by -\$6,528.33 in non-pledge giving. So, our net year-to-date envelope giving is ahead by \$8,502.29.

St. Peter's Pipes for Praise Update: Fundraising has received gifts as of August of \$269,270.95 and the reserve from the General Fund has been reduced to \$80,729.05. The available General Fund after the organ project reserve and the projected budget deficit is \$258.021.63. The Designated Reserve Fund balance is \$50.476.15.





Food Pantry Update

Loaves and Fish Pantry

Our newer schedule, as of August 28, is as follows:

Monday: 1:00 - 3:00 pm **Tuesday:** 3:30 - 5:00 pm **Wednesday:** 12:30 - 2:30 **Friday:** 10:00 am - 12:00 pm

The Loaves and Fishes pantry volunteers will be going "Above and Beyond" these next few months as they help our clients participate in a number of other programs sponsored by the Lower Cape Outreach Council. Not only will our volunteer teams be stocking the shelves and filling grocery bags to help feed well over 400 people, they will be helping families register for free winter coats, a turkey along with all the sides for a wonderful Turkey Dinner, and a chance to shop for Christmas gifts for their children at the Santa Stop. Last year we provided 35 children and adults with warm winter coats and sneakers provided through the LCOC with funding from Operation Warm, a national non-profit that has given away over 5 million coats over the past 25 years. This is one of the few programs giving away new coats to adults as well as children.

Our volunteers also helped provide all the food for 36 turkey dinners and gifts for 75 children and teenagers. We fully expect the numbers will be over double that this year considering the number of families we are now servicing here at St. Peter's. There were 42 pantry visits in August, 2022 and then in August, 2023 we had 138 visits! Watch for more information and volunteer opportunities for the turkey distribution in the November Newsletter.

We received disappointing news last week at our Manger's Meeting because the Greater Boston Food Bank is having to cut the number of pounds of food they deliver by 25%. We know that all of the pantries are experiencing an increase in the number of people using the pantries, but there is also a shortage of staff to load the trucks at the Boston warehouse. We have had to limit the number of groceries each family can get but, with your help, we are still providing many staple items to feed and support our families. Please keep sending in your donations, brown paper bags, egg cartons and coupons. Every little bit helps!

Nauset Interfaith Association: A Faithful Response to Gun Violence

At a well-attended event sponsored by the Interfaith Justice Committee of the Federated Church of Orleans and Am HaYam Havurah —"A Community Conversation: Firearms Violence - How Safe Are We?" — panelists relayed sobering statistics: In 2023 so far, more than 25,000 men, women and children have been victims of gun deaths, and more than 14,000 were suicides. The Justice Committee believes that this reality far exceeds politics, and it is a matter for a response from communities of faith. During the program on August 6 (which is available to view on the church's website or at https://youtube.com/live/N_oCQa0nZDw), three outstanding panelists spoke of measures undertaken to enhance safety in an era of gun violence, including legislative initiatives, local law enforcement, and mental health responses. Everyone attending was challenged to commit to some action to further community well-being. Now, the Board of Directors of Nauset Interfaith Association urges members of its congregations to consider contacting legislators in support of this proposed bill before the Massachusetts legislature:

HD4420 - An Act Modernizing Firearms. This is an omnibus bill, containing many features that would be vital additions to Massachusetts' already sensible gun regulations - without infringing on Second Amendment rights. Note: As this bill progresses through the legislature, it may go through different versions and different numbering. However, advocating for "all features currently found in HD4420" will be clear to legislators. It would:

- Direct State Police to conduct inspections of gun dealers
- Tighten regulations concerning assault-style weapons
- Establish a committee on community-based gun violence intervention
- Criminalize ghost guns, requiring all firearms to be serialized
- Expand who can file red flag petitions (re a person in crisis)
- Establish a committee on new gun safety technologies ("smart guns," etc.)

Please consider taking this faithful action in response to gun violence: Urge our legislators to support this vital bill.


The Power of Intuition

One of God's greatest gifts was to bestow intuition so So man could create the innovations we have today.

This column deals with innovations of energy we hope to create by the end of the twenty-first century. Man is already using his intuition to generate cheap electricity. A big plant in New Mexico is being built where scientists hope to fuse hydrogen into helium just like the sun does! Can you imagine a tiny sun on the Earth's surface? Currently, millions of solar mirror panels are being installed on roof tops all over the world. Both the US and Japan are building solar mirror satellites that will capture energy from the sun and then transmit it to the Earth twenty-four hours a day! Japan has lakes covered with solar mirrors that supply electricity to metropolitan areas.

Covenant for Congregations

It has been our privilege to support the mission and ministry of the Reverends Christian G. N. Holleck and Tiffany L. Nicely Holleck as Co-Pastors of Saint Peter's Lutheran Church of Cape Cod at 310 Route 137, Harwich, Massachusetts.

In prayerful conversation with Co-Pastors Christian and Tiffany Nicely Holleck, the Congregation Council, on behalf of the congregation, has discussed the Healthy Transitions policies and expectations of the New England Synod of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America, and we enter into the following Covenant.

We agree:

- * to pray for the ongoing mission of our congregation and for our rostered leadership;
- to respect the terms of the attached Covenant for Departing Ministers;

Covenant for Departing Rostered Ministers (Not Retiring)

It has been my privilege to support the mission and ministry of Saint Peter's Lutheran Church of Cape Cod at 310 Route 137, Harwich, Massachusetts as Co-Pastor.
