Transition Happenings

With the resignation of our pastors, members and friends of St Peter's are wondering how the transition to new pastoral leadership will take place. The Congregation's Council, which will be in charge until a new pastor is chosen, has been busy planning for leadership in the many activities that make St Peter's a place of worship, welcome, and outreach.

Throughout the transition process we will be guided by **Kim Bergstrand**. Ms. Bergstrand is the Associate to the Bishop for RI and Southeastern MA. The Council has already met with her, and she is available by phone or email as questions arise. She will also be working closely with the various teams as they are selected.

Already selected is the **Transition Team**. This group, working with Kim, will plan the initial phases of the transition: among other tasks farewell events, a CAT (Congregational Assessment Tool) survey, church history event, and community needs assessment. The team consists of Kathy Glifort (representing Council), Jane Wordsworth, Jim Merriam, Claudia Bellis, Elaine Davis, and Ken Thomas.

Soon a **Ministry Site Profile** team will be selected. Coordinating with the Transition team, they will use their internet and writing skills to construct a profile of the church which will be presented to pastoral candidates to introduce them to who we are.

Further into the future, a **Call Committee** will be formed to work with the Associate to the Bishop to evaluate a candidate or candidates for ministry at St Peter's. Part of the initial process involves identifying an **Intentional Interim Minister** who is specially trained to work with congregations experiencing challenging events; in our case welcoming the Cape Cod Christian Academy next month, planning for the installation of the organ and the changes in the sanctuary, and moving from one and one-half pastoral positions to one pastor. In the meantime, we count on our excellent staff to continue to support us as they are doing now.

We are pleased to report that our intentional interim pastor has already been selected. The Reverend Sandi D'Amico lives in Warwick, RI, has been specially trained as an intentional interim pastor, and will be joining us during the week of October 1. Congregation President Juliet Bongfeldt has been in conversation with her and is confident that she will capably guide us through the next months, as we identify our ministries, search for a new pastor, and seek God's guidance for our future.

The council is committed to keeping the congregation fully informed as events or changes are anticipated. Please feel free to contact council members with questions or suggestions as we move into this new territory.

Beginnings and Endings - Reflecting on Hellos and Goodbyes

Time and time again someone will share with me how much it meant when they were greeted, when someone said hello. Sometimes it is the difference between someone becoming a member or friend of the church or a one-time visitor. The greeting need not even always be verbal. A young adult was invited to attend worship with a friend one Sunday morning. To her surprise and delight, she saw the colored rainbow flag. "Wow," she later said. "It wasn't the gray hairs or lack of young people that became her first impression. Rather, it was 'I am welcome here.'" Self-identifying neither as Christian nor heterosexual, she was able to joyfully enter and listen to hymns, scriptures, and a homily about Jesus.

As the Hollecks prepare to depart St. Peter's one morning I realize how we yearn for a *good bye*. And so, we were delighted one morning to find a small gift box on our desk with the note:

"One Sun under God,

From Harwich to Yuba City.

May His light always shine through you."

Inside the box were four pairs of Sunglasses! On the arms of each pair of glasses were stickers, on the left, "St. Peter's" and on the right, "St. Andrew."

Liturgically, we have a special, beautiful way of saying hello and goodbye. We say welcome, and go in peace. Greeters welcome people as they arrive. Tiffany and I, as presiding pastors, greet you at the end of worship, sometimes saying "Good morning" or "Welcome," even more often, saying "Peace be with you."

A Look Back: View From the Deck, September 2006

What is behind that name anyway? One of the ancient symbols of the Church was a boat. Our Christian journey begins with our baptisms, when we are plunged into the river of Life with the promise that we belong to God. The goal of the Church was to get to the other shore of God's kingdom, where God will welcome us home.

There are many ways to look at the journey. Some people are not comfortable on the water and can be heard to say, "Sit down! Stop rocking the boat!" Others though love the challenge of a storm, wanting to test their skills against Mother Nature's worst. Some people think that the journey is like a cruise, time to sit back and relax and not worry about how they'll get to where they are going. Others want to be more physically active, hoisting sails and coiling lines, assisting in the journey.

Being a church and Christian community so close to the water (waters!) and with a name like St. Peter's we can be playful with this theme and images. Who's on the boat? Each one of us: members, friends, visitors, staff. Where are we headed? Home. And whose boat is this? Be very clear on this: this boat belongs to God and to God alone. The Church is not Pastor Christian's or mine. No single committee or group in the church is in charge. Christ alone is the captain of the ship (and captain of our hearts!) and he is at the wheel. He has the charts, knows the course on which we are headed, and is fully in command.

Each of us have important roles to play on the boat. Some are needed to hoist the sails. Others need to stand on the lookout for the buoys and hazards in the water. Some are needed to sit and balance out the boat. Each of us will get time to relax and rest along the way. Each of us will also have busy times on board. No matter what we're doing we need to keep both ears open to hear our captain's commands.

Storms will come up from time to time. There will be times of dead calm with no wind and no movement forward (hopefully few and far between.) But usually we'll be on the proper tack to get us to where we need to be. Hopefully we won't need to use the life preservers and won't encounter pirates along the way.

I've heard many people say, "I'm retired" here at St. Peter's. But the truth is you just stepped off the career track. You are still on board with us. So please don't sit back in your deck chair and wait for someone to come and serve you a drink. We don't have waiters; we're all too busy pulling together on this crew. Please join us! We'd love to have all hands on deck!




The St. Peter's Prayer Shaw Ministry will tentatively meet on Friday, September 1 and 15 at 1:30 pm in the Luther Room.

Please note that the Loaves and Fishes Pantry has made a few changes in the days and times we are open so that we can work around the Cape Cod Christian Academy schedule. These changes will better serve our clients as we are adding a late afternoon time and many of our regulars have expressed excitement about this addition. Most of the holidays come on Mondays so having the pantry open Tuesday should also help our families.

We have a wonderful team of faithful volunteers here at the pantry and have even had several visiting grandchildren and other relatives come and volunteer to help during deliveries or stock the shelves. It is so nice to see the younger generations so interested in helping others. Recently we have added several volunteers to the team. Ross Gorman has been helping Curt Douglas with deliveries for the past year but is now joined by his friend Paul Sullivan. Sharon Gorman has been stocking the pantry after some of our busy days when 14-18 clients use the pantry on one day and leave the shelves bare. Sharon will join the Tuesday team along with Anne Ekstrom and Mary McCarthy, another new volunteer who began helping us this summer. Carol Schachinger has also agreed to help and will be covering for the time I am out in November after knee replacement. Welcome to everyone who is joining our long standing volunteers and substitutes Carol Virlik, Karen Beggs, Shawn Krum, Mary Keating, Aline Glifort, Carol Cameron, and Jetty Sousa Lampson.

Our numbers have increased steadily all year and the same is happening at all the local pantries here on Cape Cod. It has become increasingly difficult to get needed food items so we are very grateful to our regular donors. Our storage shelves have been totally empty several times this summer and we have had to purchase many more items just to get by. The bags of cereal, canned goods, taco supplies, etc., continue to help us meet the needs of our neighbors. It was a difficult decision but we are currently having to limit the number of certain items families can take. As you say good bye to family and summer guests, consider looking through your

cupboards for any items purchased that you might not use. I know that I stock up on favorite cereals and snack items that the grandkids enjoy but I shouldn't eat. UPDATES FROM URUGUAY Soanna's June Newsletter A QUICK REFRESHER:

I am serving as a volunteer with the Young Adults in Global Mission (YAGM) program of the ELCA. I'm working alongside the local organization the Obra Ecuménica (The Ecumenical Project) and the Lutheran congregation of Nuestro Salvador (Our Savior) in Montevideo. As a YAGM, my mission is centered around the idea of accompaniment, which emphasizes the fact that we don't need to bring God to the communities we're walking alongside because God is already there.

It's hard to believe that my volunteer service in Uruguay has already come to an end. In fact, the program ended almost exactly a month ago, but I've waited to write this final newsletter for several reasons. Primarily, I wanted time to reflect on the end of the year and how it really feels to leave behind everything and everyone I had come to know over the past 10 months. Additionally, I spent several weeks travelling, taking my time as I worked my way home. I wanted to enjoy this time travelling and experience other parts of Latin America without stressing about getting my newsletter written in time or spending several hours on my laptop writing. After all this, I'm now ready and happy to share this final newsletter with all of you as I reflect on my last month in Uruguay and how it feels to leave my community.

My last month was filled with a lot of lasts, but also with some of the most positive memories that I have from my entire period of volunteer service. I started the month by creating an "Uruguay bucket list" of places I wanted to see, things I wanted to do and foods I wanted to eat before leaving the country. I'm glad to say that I was able to check most of these items off the list. I visited the National Museum of Art, where I enjoyed seeing a diverse mix of paintings and sculptures from Uruguayan artists, walked through a zoo with free-roaming peacocks and flamingos, and watched Uruguay's national soccer team win a friendly game against Nicaragua.

June was a month of many celebrations – for both me and Uruguay. Uruguay won the Under 20 World Cup, and many people took to the streets after the game, honking car horns and waving Uruguayan flags. I also attended the traditional Brazilian festival Festa Junina, complete with costumes, games, and a large bonfire (Uruguay borders Brazil and many of its customs and traditions are influenced by Brazilian culture and/or carried on by Brazilian immigrants).

On a more personal level, I attended several goodbye parties and send-off worship services, some of which were held for me and the other volunteers from my program and others for friends - volunteers from other countries who did similar

church-related volunteer programs with different denominations. The congregation of Nuestro Salvador, the church that I attended while in Uruguay, held a send-off worship service and coffee hour for the other volunteer from my program and me. During the coffee hour, several members of the congregation shared positive memories and affirmations with us, sending us off with well wishes. A few days later, the Obra Ecumenica held a small goodbye party for a different volunteer and me and they presented each of us with mug with pictures of us at work at the Obra printed on it. I also had a goodbye party with the students who lived in the student home with me. We enjoyed making pizza together and teaching each other card games – I learned some classic Uruguayan games and then taught them one of my family's favorite games.

These send-offs and goodbyes made me feel like an honored and cherished part of the community. The thoughtful reflections that the congregation shared, the kind and personalized gift from my volunteer organization and the interest that my roommates shared in learning new games are some of the most positive memories that I have from each of these communities. These actions made me feel valued, included and loved. In some ways, this felt bittersweet because throughout

the year I yearned to feel like I was truly welcomed into a tight-knit community, but had a hard time feeling that I really fit in – not necessarily because I was an outsider, but because none of these communities are particularly tight-knit themselves. Instead of lamenting that I didn't have more positive experiences of community earlier in the year, I'm grateful that these shared moments of joy at various goodbye parties gave me a chance to end on a high note and leave with happy memories.

One of the questions that I was asked a lot in my final weeks was how I felt about leaving and whether I was ready for my volunteer service to be over. I answered that I wasn't ready to leave, but that I was ready to go home. One month later, this answer is still true – although I am very grateful for my time in Uruguay and everything that I learned, I am ready to be home, to return to my home community, and to take my next steps.

Thank you to each of you for all the ways that you supported me on this journey. Saying

goodbye and returning to the United States was so much easier knowing that there are so many people who support me and were ready to welcome me home.

Elementary Chemistry for Everyone

The composition of matter in the universe in based on just a little over one hundred elements. The common ones range from hydrogen to lead numbered 1 - 83. This column deals with a few elements we're most used to in material and living organisms.

Hydrogen is the smallest, lightest and most active of all the elements. In its natural state, it exists as a gas always seeking to chemically combine with other elements such as oxygen to form water. Oxygen is the most abundant element and without its presence in the air, our demise would occur in about one minute! Besides the air we breathe, about 50% of the earth's crust is composed of oxygen in the form of silicon dioxide (sand). Over twenty million tons of nitrogen occurs over every square mile of the Earth, and it's an essential constituent in the proteins of all living organisms.

As an element, carbon can either be graphite or formed under high pressure as a diamond. Numerous compounds contains carbon such as carbon dioxide and limestone. All forms of coal contain carbon, hydrogen, and oxygen. Sodium is a very active element that combines easily with numerous elements such as chlorine when table salt (NaCl) is formed.

Aluminum is the third most abundant element preceded only by oxygen and silicon. Sulfur occurs freely in nature especially during volcanic activity, and it's found in compounds containing iron and lead. Iron is used for the construction of many materials, but it needs to be alloyed with other elements to make it as hard as steel. By itself, iron is soft and malleable.

Lead is a very dense, soft, bluish, metallic element used to make solder and bullets. Galena (PbS) is a good ore of lead, because sulfur can easily be melted away from the lead.

The native elements are copper, silver, platinum, gold and mercury. Copper is a metallic conductor of heat and electricity and is used to make wiring and statues. Silver is a metallic, ductile element used in dentistry and electrical components. Gold is a soft, yellow and malleable element used as an international monetary standard. Mercury is a poisonous, silvery-white liquid metal used to make thermometers and heading control devices.

These are just a few common elements we deal with. God, however, uses all of the 108 elements for creations across the universe!
