From the Council

Over the past two months, the Leadership of St. Peter's have been gathering to discuss and act on the business of the church. Below are some highlights of their work together. For full minutes of the meetings, please email the President or Pastor.

May

- Receipts for May were behind by \$7,313 in pledge and non-pledge giving, resulting in a net \$6,748 revenue shortfall.
- Worship continues to be shaped by guest organists.
- The search for a new Ministry Administrator continues as the position was offered and then declined. A strong Music Minister candidate was identified and is being pursued.
- The Caregiver's Retreat was well received.
- Revenue and Expenses will be published quarterly to the congregation.
- Chimney work was completed at the Parsonage.
- Funds have been identified by an anonymous donor to air condition the Food Pantry area.
- Edits to the Memorial Garden procedures and protocols were adopted.

June

- Pledged and non-pledged giving are ahead by \$6,245.
- The search continued for the Ministry Administrator and Minister of Music.
- Pastoral care, with help from the Anderson Bequest, will sponsor a Nonagenarian Brunch.
- The Finance Committee is discerning investment options for Land Sale receipts.
- Building inspections were completed and a health inspection will occur on 6/24.
- The Memorial Gardens have been mulched by Paul Luciano.
- JustPeace reports that attendance at the new ESL classes has increased.
- Installation of the air conditioning for the Food Pantry was approved.
- Lynn Hatch is organizing a sale of her late husband, Richard's, art to benefit the Food Pantry.

Loaves & Fishes Food Pantry

Last month our Loaves and Fishes Pantry fed 635 people including 285 children. Most of these were our regular shoppers trying to keep food on the table in a time when expenses continue to rise but now we are seeing some of our Senior Citizens return. The seasonal workers arrived a little later this year and rely on the pantry for a few weeks until they get more shifts or second jobs. They are very appreciative of this help as they get settled.

The Lower Cape Outreach Council just announced that Katy's Korner has reopened in their beautiful and newly remodeled location on the main floor of the LCOC office at 19 Brewster Cross Rd. in Orleans. Families are able to get needed clothes, bedding, linens, housewares and small appliances.

They are now open weekdays from 9:30-12:00 and are in need of summer clothing and household goods. Many of you have donated in the past and can look on the LCOC website for specific items they do and do not accept. If you do have items to drop off, we hope you also get a chance to peak at the new pantry located in the basement of 19 Brewster Cross Rd.

For several years we have helped him as he only goes out for his long trips to Plymouth for dialysis three times a week and to pick up medical supplies using public transportation. Thanks to your donations, we have been able to buy him certain food items that are not readily available from our Greater Boston Food Bank deliveries. Last year he beamed when he told me the added food made a big difference in his lab work and overall health.

Unfortunately, he was suddenly forced to move from the room he was renting and had to leave the Cape. He texted me on his way to New York and I want to share it with you. "Thanks again for everything you did for me. I'm so grateful. Much love and yah bless. I hope I can find some people like you guys in Brooklyn."

We have a very special community here at St. Peter's and we do hope he finds people like all of you.

Synod Assembly

Reflections

Gayle and I were grateful for the opportunity to join Pastor Christephor at the 2026 Synod Assembly. It was a meaningful chance to take part in the work of the church at a regional level while also enjoying fellowship and moments of joy along the way.

Throughout the assembly, we heard inspiring stories, received updates from ministry partners, worshiped together, and reconnected with both old and new friends.

Assembly Highlights

One of the joys of the assembly is seeing the wide range of people who come together to serve and participate. This year, there were 350 voting members, including 143 pastors, along with 61 visitors, for a total attendance of 411.



The gathering reflected the diversity of Christ's church, bringing together people of many ages, genders, languages, nationalities, and backgrounds.

The three worship services were especially powerful, enriched by the many expressions of Lutheran faith and by the shared experience of praising God and gathering at the table.

Associate to the Bishop Kim Bergstrand offered a prayer before approving the budget, reports, and each vote.

The Assembly passed a resolution supporting a boycott of companies seen as complicit in the suffering of the Palestinian people, as well as in settlement expansion and occupation in Gaza and the West Bank.

The Assembly also committed to active participation in the World Council of Churches Ecumenical Decade of Climate Justice Action. These actions reflected a shared commitment to seeking healing and new life in the world to the glory of God.

Speakers, Workshops, Reports

We also heard a meaningful message from Presiding Bishop Yehiel Curry and listened to a variety of guests and speakers who highlighted ministries and opportunities across the synod. The three-day assembly included four workshop sessions, and the workshops I attended were filled to standing room only.

Additional highlights included Casey Wilson's report as Vice President, the panel on Palestine and the Holy Land, update on the DKS Lawsuit, plans for the rebuilding of Faith Church, Cambridge and the recognition of Executive to the Bishop and Manager of Operations Lynn Wasilewski on her retirement. There were a wonderful exhibit and talk – "Art for Heros", a graduation - School of Lay Ministers, and our group elected Pastors Christophor and Jeffery Johnson, Brockton as Co-Dean of the SE MA churches.

A Closing Reflection

Bishop Piphon's messages were uplifting and hopeful, centered on change, endings, and rebuilding. One of the most memorable reminders was this: "Jesus' intent was to build community with diverse people—to build up the kingdom of God on earth with people of all nations and tribes and languages and cultures and skin color and abilities and genders and economic status—until that glorious day when all people are made well by faith and rise up to new life in Christ."

That vision remains God's call today. We are invited to follow the example of Jesus by noticing the people around us, responding to their needs, teaching, inviting, healing, and helping bring new life through the power of Christ's Word.

God calls us to act boldly, to build community with diverse people, and to nurture creation.

Assembly Thoughts

from Gayle!

Gayle Olson, who attended Synod Assembly with her husband Russ and Pastor Christophor, offers some detailed reflections on the workshops she attended at the Assembly. Below is the first of three you will see throughout the Network!

SUMUD/Make Hummas, Not War

Sumud (صمود) is an Arabic word that means steadfastness, resilience. The people of Palestine must have this every day, as their land area has dramatically decreased by over 70% since the Second World War.

Checkpoints make daily life very challenging: many are unable to get to/from work without HOURS of waiting DAILY. Some cannot see family. Ninety-five percent of the farmland in the Gaza Strip has been destroyed or taken by settlers (Israelis). Despite all this, students continue to try to learn and beat the common thought that there is no future in Palestine. The students refuse to give in and state that their strength comes from God's abiding presence and is not just blind optimism.

That's why our schools and churches there are so important - they provide hope! Many organizations are supporting the schools, such as Bright Stars of Bethlehem and Opportunity Palestine.

Boycotting is one means of putting pressure on US-based companies not to be complicit with Israel. This does not mean that we are antisemitic. The boycotts are to discourage aid for the Israeli military regime, not Jewish people. Trying to avoid buying certain products AND WRITING to the companies to explain why you are boycotting, does work. The more the companies hear from people and stop purchasing their products, they start to listen and will change their practices. Remember the 3.5% rule: If just 3.5% of people insist on change, companies/governments can be forced to change.

QCD and RMD: the Alphabet Soup of Charitable Giving by Seniors

The following general explanations are meant to inspire you to consider how you and St. Peter's might benefit from QCD and RMD. It is best to discuss how these tax regulations apply to your individual situation with a tax expert or financial advisor.

What is QCD?

QCD stands for qualified charitable distribution. A Qualified Charitable Distribution (QCD) allows individuals aged 70½ and older to make tax-free donations directly from their IRA or 401(k) to a qualified charity, **potentially** satisfying part or all of their required minimum distributions (RMDs).

What is RMD?

RMD stands for required minimum distribution. A Required Minimum Distribution (RMD) is the minimum amount you must withdraw annually



from certain tax-deferred retirement accounts, such as traditional IRAs, starting at age 73 to avoid paying penalties. The rules for RMD starting ages have changed recently: in the past, the starting age for RMDs was 70½. However, as of 2023, the starting age stands at 73 and is set to increase to 75 in the future. You can contribute all or a portion of your RMD to a qualified charity but it must be sent directly the charity from the account where it is invested; for example, Fidelity, Vanguard, Schwab, Merrill, etc.

St. Peter's Lutheran Church is a qualified charity.

Did you know you can make donations to St. Peter's including your regular offering directly from your IRA or 401(K) to satisfy the requirements for QCD and potentially RMD? Donating to the St. Peter's Lutheran Church Food Pantry, Parsonage Fund, Capital Improvement Fund, one of the other missions, or your regular offering from your retirement account is a great way to take advantage of QCD and RMD tax benefits you may be eligible for. Arrange for checks sent by investment companies to be made out to /payable to St Peter's Lutheran Church of Cape Cod with your name on the memo line. You can also notify Lois Thomas, Financial Secretary so the RMD donation is properly recorded by St. Peter's. Please contact whomever advises you on taxes or investments to learn more about your individual situation.

Seafarers' Friend Workshop

Since we donate ditty bags to this organization each year, I decided to learn more about its work. At any given time, there are about two million seafarers—people who work on ships—at sea around the world. Did you know that 90–93% of everything we touch arrives by ship? Most seafarers come from Indonesia, China, and the Philippines, and many spend weeks at sea with crews of only 18–25 people.

When ships reach port, crew members often hope to shop, explore, or simply connect with others. Many cannot leave due to visa restrictions, so Seafarers' organizations step in, delivering needed items, providing transportation, and offering companionship. They also partner with NAMMA to assist seafarers facing family emergencies.

Boston's new welcome center in Chelsea sounds wonderful, and I may hand-deliver our ditty bags this year! One final note: seafarers especially love the hand-knit hats—they're treasured keepsakes. So get knitting and crocheting now!

Wednesday Evening Worship at the Latham School in Brewster



On May 20th four of us from St. Peters joined a small group of Latham School students for an uplifting and energetic evening of worship and praise. The school is internationally recognized for its work supporting children with developmental disabilities, especially Prader-Willi syndrome. Its mission is to promote independence, self-worth, and happiness for people with complex disabilities.

Kayden Kaser and MJ Pattison led songs on the guitar, while Karen Bulin and Donna Albert led the hand motions for “Rise and Shine”, “The Garden Song”, “I’ve got Peace like a River” and “This Little light of mine”. Karen Bulin taught everyone a memory verse and led the prayers, Donna Albert offered an interactive meditation on “The Kingdom of God is like a grain of mustard seed”.

Jesus said, “Let the children come to me, and do not stop them, for it is to such as these that the kingdom of heaven belongs.”

Matthew 19:14

At the end of our time together Kayden remarked “I always feel so good when we do this..” She spoke for all of us.

Worship at the Latham School is offered three times a year, although the coordinator Brooke Eaton-Skea who attends the church of the Holy Spirit would like to offer them more often. If you think you might like to join us the next time we are scheduled please speak to any of us and we will contact you in the future.

It has been exciting and delightful to have Pastor Christophor join in on our committee meetings since this past December. Our goal has been to assist him along the way as he creatively and appropriately suggests alternate ideas for delivering the Lord's message in our Lutheran tradition. We appreciated his thoughtfulness and efforts in creating the Worship Survey which assessed the congregation's receptiveness to these changes. The survey results helped determine whether or not to continue or modify some of the changes.

The committee also continues to attend to the basic aspects of our worship services, most importantly assuring there are worship assistants for every Sunday and as well as special services. Thank you to all who have stepped in to serve as greeters, ushers and liturgists. In addition, we work to support the Altar Care team and seek Communion assistants as needed. The sign-up sheet for the months of June, July and August is located in the Narthex on the table alongside the stairwell. Please ask anyone from our committee if you have questions regarding these assistant responsibilities.

Worship & Music

Finally, our committee has been given the task of securing substitute musicians (organists, pianists, etc) for every service since Easter (April 5). And, as the Minister of Music Search team progresses with their review of applicants and scheduling auditions, the substitutes will continue to be scheduled until this position is filled.

Stewardship Giving Report

Below is a breakdown of the gifts St. Peter's has received from January 1 through June 21, 2026:

Our total budgeted giving through June 21 is \$143,324, and the actual receipts are \$148,777. Overall, our receipts are ahead by \$5,453.

Assembly Thoughts *from Cayle!*

Thrivent

Thrivent has more than two million members and returns millions of dollars to communities through grants and service projects. A simple guideline for funding requests is: Does it do good? Does it require money? Is it legal? If the answer is yes, an Action Team grant may be available.

Each Action Team provides \$250, and there is no limit to the number of requests as long as

each supports a different activity or need. For example, our Loaves & Fishes Food Pantry could seek monthly support for hard-to-obtain food items. Last year, the Cranberry Fair received \$250 for advertising; this year, separate requests could support improved roadside signs and electronic promotion.

Associate membership in Thrivent costs \$20 annually and includes one Choice Dollars gift and one Action Team grant. Imagine the impact if more of us participated!

Parsonage Fund Update

“Each one must give as he has decided in his heart, not reluctantly or under compulsion, for God loves a cheerful giver.”

2 Corinthians 9:7



As you recall, in mid-December 2024, at a Special Congregational Meeting, the members of St. Peter’s authorized the Congregation Council to purchase a house to be used as a parsonage for \$300,000 with closing costs not to exceed \$15,000, totaling \$315,000. To meet the cost of \$315,000, we borrowed money from the General Fund and the Designated Reserve Fund.

An additional \$75,000 was approved for repairs and upgrades to the parsonage. The Council authorized fundraising over a 2-year period to help cover all costs. In addition, the sale of church land was approved to replenish the General Fund and aid in the cost of repairs.

We received 30 pledges for the Parsonage Fund in the amount of \$88,960 for this 2-year period. As of June 21, nineteen have paid their pledge in full. In addition, many who didn’t pledge gave generously. As of June 21, we have received \$154,848 in gifts. We have \$6,886 in outstanding pledges.

After paying for the costs of upgrades to the Parsonage, we have repaid the General Fund \$80,893.

We thank all of you for your generosity in support of this purchase. We encourage you to give to the Parsonage Fund as you are able during the remainder of this year.

St. Peter's Sojourners
