View From the Deck

Greetings, brothers and sisters in Christ!



Lutheran theology often articulates a "both...and...." We are both sinners *and* saints. The Kingdom of God is both now *and* not yet. Jesus is both God *and* human.

I think this "both-and" will serve us well as we continue to navigate the COVID19 pandemic, summer time on the Cape and what 'reopening' might look like for St. Peter's. As many of you know, the Council appointed an 'Oversight Team for Reopening' which is considering options and making recommendations. The team is working to come up with safe protocols for outdoor worship. This will happen in phases, beginning as a small mid-week service and then expanding. We will continue to offer virtual services on-line, as we know that the majority of our congregation falls into the higher risk (over 65 years old and/or pre-existing conditions) category. In fact, we are exploring ways we can upgrade the technology we have and use, so that when we are back in the sanctuary for worship we can more easily live-stream and/or record services for those unable or choosing not to come. We need to be flexible. We need to be patient. And we need a sense of adventure! Yes, adventure. If you can't resonate with that, how about 'new venture.' As Bishop Hazelwood of the New England Synod, said, if we are expecting a quick return to the "normalcy" of "January church" we will be both disappointed and frustrated. On the other hand, if we take the approach that the Spirit, whose coming we celebrate this Sunday on Pentecost, is leading us on new ventures we can move through these uncertain times trusting that God will do something new.

That's just it! After Jesus died, things did not return to the way things were before. After Jesus died, God didn't say, "We need to make the best of a bad situation. I'll send you the Holy Spirit to help you get through this." Yes, the Holy Spirit is called "Helper." But God's vision is bigger:

"But you will receive power when the Holy Spirit has come upon you; and you will be my witnesses in Jerusalem, in all Judea and Samaria, and to the ends of the earth... (Acts 1:8)

Some of the disciples have been "paralyzed with fear." Some have been "waiting and praying." Suddenly, on Pentecost, a wind fills the house where they are staying. It doesn't just blow through the house. It blows through their hearts and minds and very souls! "All of them were filled with the Holy Spirit and began to speak in other languages, as the Spirit gave them ability (2:4)." How will God's Spirit surprise us? How will God's Spirit work through us to strengthen old relationships and form new ones – for the sake of sharing the gospel in word and deed?

God will do something new. Let us not merely remember Pentecost. Together, let us prepare for God's Spirit to guide us. Let us prepare to *live* Pentecost in new ways.



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Through the Lens of Science...

POTENTIAL Coronavirus VACCINES by Doug Kenney

Oxford University in England is the first to begin clinical trials of their vaccine called: ChAdOx1 nCoV-19. About 1,110 people will receive the vaccine. Half of them will receive the vaccine and the other half (the control group) will receive a widely available meningitis vaccine in the Thames Valley area. The vaccine is based on an adenovirus vector and the SARS-CoV-2 spike protein. SARS stands for: Severe Acute Respiratory Syndrome. The vaccine should generate good immune responses against the virus. Participants will be aged 18 to 55 years old and be in good health.

Universities all over the world are racing to identify reliable coronavirus vaccines.

The Kaiser Permanete Wahington Research Center in Seattle has developed a vaccine called: mRNA-1273. The center is a biotechnology company pioneering the messenger RNA vaccines. The first volunteer was dosed at the National Institute of Health located in Bethesda, Maryland. Bill and Melinda Gates have awared a 5 million dollar grant!

The World Health Organization favors a drug called: Remdesivir. It turns out, a man was recently hospitalized, and on day 7 this experimental drug was given to him. By the next day, he improved dramatically! There's another drug called: Chloroqiine that appears to be a potential coronavirus vaccine, and trials are about to begin.

The Bacillus Calmette-Guerin vaccine is widely used around the world. It does more than prevent TB (tuberculosis); it sharply reduces the incidence of respiratory infections! It was given to thousands of health care workers in Australia and the Netherlands.

A vaccine called CoroFlu has been developed by the Univ. of Wisconsin in Madison. If the genetic sequences of the coronavirus are inserted into M2SR it could be a vaccine for both the Coronavirus and the Flu. Virologists have rated CoroFlu as a promising vaccine.

The University of Queensland in Australia has developed a vaccine called: S - Spike jab The vaccine was created by hijacking the virus's own infectious properties. It produced a protein that's identical to the one on the virus's surface. That protein is the essence of the vaccine, and it has already shown much promise in treating animals.


"CureVac" is a company in Germany that plans to test a new vaccine in June, 2020. They will not name this vaccine until the tests prove to be worthwhile. When a vaccine is approved by the FDA, it must be risk-free for public consumption.


Doris was an active member of St Peter's Lutheran Church of Cape Cod in Harwich and participated in the Esther Circle group.
